## Are You Ready for God?

Richard Rohr says, "If you are not ready to change, don't seek out God." Spiritual growth means that something must change. And if you're like me, you may be more inclined to keep everything the same in order to avoid any change.

We need to be gentle with ourselves though. Life is hard. Sometimes bad, terrible things happen to good people. I'm certain that every one of us has a story of a friend or a family member who went through some ugly ordeal through no fault of their own. Maybe you have a story too, of undeserved pain, of something awful that happened to you.

However, I am also fairly certain that every one of us realizes that many of our circumstances are chosen. Our behavior can lead to all sorts of dumb stuff happening to us. In my life, the less time I spend in prayer and quiet reflection the more time I spend in worry and anxiety and that almost always leads to fear and foolishness.

A friend of mine is a personal trainer at a local gym. He is also a pentecostal pastor. One day he saw me lifting weights in an incorrect form. "You're doing that all wrong, Pastor Glen. At the end of the workout you'll be in pain." I laughed and said, "Terrance, that will preach!"

He then told me that he sees people all the time who want to lose weight or get in better shape. They set up a regimen and they go for it but after a few weeks or months they don't seem to have improved much or they have even regressed. So, good pastor that he is, he'll ask them what they've been up to. And sure enough they will tell him! Too much drinking or too many desserts or too many late nights and encounters with the wrong sorts of persons, and on and on. He's almost like the Dr. Phil of the gym when he asks, "And how's that working out for you?"

That is a tough question to face but the revelation of the truth, no matter how bad it may feel, no matter how frightening it may be, will lead to a new way of life.

Are you ready for God? God is ready for you.

## High School Mission Team in Chicago



## Immortality for All

In music, a cadence is a point where the composition comes to a place of rest. A cadence might mark the end of a phrase, a section, or the end of the piece. Cadences are a lot like punctuation in a sentence. They might reflect a comma, colon, semi-colon, period, even an exclamation point. Of course, cadences appear in life as well.

Consider the following life transitions: graduation from high school or college; marriage/divorce; baptism/ordination; a new job or retirement. All provide moments in our lives that are open or closed. Each

of these life events adds to our lives the commas, colons and exclamation points, just like a musical cadence or grammatical punctuation. Of course, in terms of human existence, the final transition is death. It is the ultimate period. I am reminded, though, of one human death that was not a period, but a resounding colon.

Several years ago I read *The Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks*. Author Rebecca Skloot tells the true story of a poor black woman who died of cervical cancer in the early 1950s. During a biopsy, her doctor took several slices of her tumor. At that point in time the study of human cells was still in its infancy, but after experimenting with various types of culture mediums, the doctor found that not only did Henrietta's cells stay alive, but they continued to multiply in culture. They are still alive and multiplying today, 50 years after her death. From that lowly start, her cells, now known as HeLa have been used in a variety of important ways: they were used to develop the Polio vaccine; in research to find cures for other diseases; and even helped usher in the discovery of DNA and the human genome project. Countless medical students and scientists have studied the HeLa cells to better understand what makes us tick on a micro level. From an obscure life as a tobacco farmer to being known world-wide, Henrietta Lacks has achieved immortality in a very real way.

This time of year, as summer is in full bloom, is usually not the time when we recall those that have gone before us. Why not, I ask? Whether it is someone that has made a lasting impact on the scientific world or a loved one or friend, one of the ways we achieve immortality is for our memory to live on in the hearts of those whose lives they touched.

Instead of waiting until Memorial Day, or late fall around All Saints Day, perhaps we should designate one day a month to recall the memories of those that have made a difference in our own lives, especially those now in the Mystery that is beyond our comprehension.


### Sunday Morning Format

conversation and activities. We are very excited about this format for the 1st-5th graders and the 3 to 6 year olds.




