New Director of Mission Partnerships Named



he Personnel Committee announces the appointment of Rev. Corey Meyer as the church's new Director of Mission Partnerships. The board voted on on his appointment in November.

Corey has a Masters in Divinity from Brite Divinity School in Fort Worth, TX. He is an ordained minister in the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) who has developed handson learning experiences through mission trips with agencies such as Urban Spirit and Disci-

ples Home Mission. He also was involved in establishing International Fountain of Hope, a non-profit organization which organizes resources to provide access to water, food and education to some of our most vulnerable global neighbors.

In the position of Director of Mission Partnerships, he will work to strengthen the partnership between Country Club Christian Church and Northeast Kansas City by building vital relationships through volunteer presence and financial investment, and he will work with lay leaders and staff in guiding the work of local hands-on mission, grants and mission trip.

Corey will join the church staff in January. T

A Word about Advent

The term Advent literally means "coming," as when historians write about the advent of the industrial age or some such thing. Or perhaps a more appropriate analogy would be the advent of winter. The season of Advent spans the four Sundays prior to Christmas, and the idea is to slow down and prepare for the coming of Christ. In our busy culture, slowing down may be next to impossible, but preparing is an essential spiritual discipline this time of year. There are lots of wonderful

traditions associated with the season, such as the weekly lighting of different candles on the Advent wreath, postponing the singing of actual Christmas carols until December 25, and decorating trees with Chrismons (monograms of Christ). The season of Advent did not get started until around the fourth century, although it was Bernard of Clairvaux in the 12th century who popularized the three-fold understanding of Advent. He said Christ came in his Bethlehem birth, will come again at the end of the age, and comes everyday into our hearts and this world. T

he beginning of Advent is a day when churches have traditionally decorated their sanctuaries, a tradition known as the Hanging of the Greens. The evergreen pine boughs and the circular wreaths symbolize everlasting life in Christ. As one can imagine, decorating our church is no small thing, and we are grateful to the committee that oversees this each year. The first Sunday of Advent, however, we will "deck the halls" with a special procession at each of our three services with candles and special ornaments known as chrismons (monograms of Christ). "Let every heart prepare him room."
