Whether you're a new visitor, or you've been

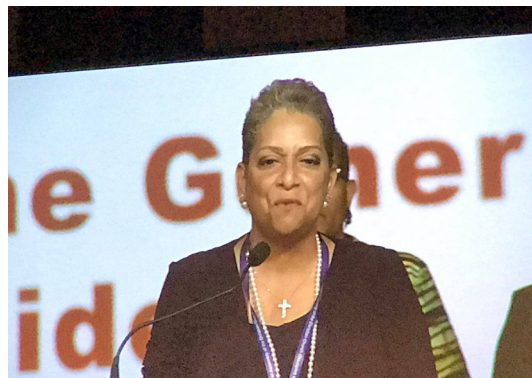
attending for a while, we invite you to join us for pastry and coffee in the library.

## Together on a New Journey

I have been walking into the same building to come to “work” for 29 years. But today feels different. And new. And scary. And exciting. I am humbled by and grateful for the call you have extended to me to serve as Senior Minister.

When I was 20 years old, I sat on the middle step of the shag carpeted stairwell of a home in Houston, Texas where I was house sitting for the summer. I didn’t know what to do. The teenage boys in the church youth group I was leading as a summer intern were giving me fits. They were testing my limits. I held my forehead up with my palms as the tears watered the shag carpet. I wanted to quit and throw in the towel on that job, on those boys and on the whole idea of ministry. I don’t know what happened exactly. But when I stood up, determined to go back to church and keep ministering to that rag tag group of teenage boys, I knew that it meant I was going to go to seminary and becoming a pastor. Something in that encounter with the silent holy presence of the living God propelled me. And I felt alive.

When I wonder if I can live up to the high calling to be your pastor, or whether I am robust enough, I then remember that you are a remarkably robust congregation. I remember about 15 years ago when I led a church mission trip to Honduras. We were hosting a pop-up medical clinic in a rather crude building with few medical supplies. Suddenly a lady was wailing loudly in the street in front of the clinic. I went outside and learned that a young mother wanted to have all of her teeth extracted. Oh and by the way, she has AIDS. I sat down with our medical team. What should we do? I don’t want to risk anyone’s health or safety. My team refused to discuss it. “We are doing it. She will be our next patient.” I was stunned. But the team was moved to tears as they learned the woman’s story. Her husband was abusive and unfaithful. She was trapped. They encountered something of the living God in helping her find some relief from the daily pain.

We cannot begin to imagine what God has in store for us as individual people nor as a congregation. But we go together now on a new journey. I pray that we will leave our excuses behind, risk ourselves, and find ourselves alive once more in the encounter with each other and with God. For a robust church deserves a robust pastor. And God no doubt waits for us.

The exact dates are not set yet, but the mission will be one of the last two weeks of February. We will focus on health and medical needs and either efficient, sustainable stoves in individual homes or water purification systems.

## The Traces We Leave

I'm currently in the process of cleaning out my desk as I prepare to transition into a fulltime position at church. The prospects ahead are exciting: short term, as we gear up for Carla Aday's installation; and longer term, as we think about what 100 years of existence – and beyond – looks like...

But it was the modest mug on my desk – the repository for my pencils, pens, a couple of rulers and a big eraser – that serves as a reminder of one of the most wondrous stories of redemption that I have ever publicly witnessed.

A number of years ago, it was part of my job to connect fine arts alumni and students. So I worked with faculty and administration to bring selected alumni back to campus to tell their career story and interact with students. One particular alumnus was on our radar for a return trip – a visual artist whose career path had taken him to major auction houses in New York City. So the visit was scheduled and confirmed.

Turns out that decades prior, the now-booked guest had made derogatory comments about the department from which he graduated... and the long-term faculty hadn't forgotten. I also learned that his senior show had been rather controversial, as his art consisted of mostly text on a variety of mediums.

So the alumnus showed up in Lawrence. And I was surprised to meet a very modest, quiet, gentle, good-humored man who wore impeccably tailored vintage clothing. He was gracious and congenial with no apparent subversive leanings.

But things came to a head at his final presentation. During the question-and-answer session, a well-known emeritus professor stood up and confronted the alumnus.

Tempered by time and experience, the artist calmly, though visibly nervous, responded, "That's why I wanted to come back. I want to say that I'm sorry for what I said." He went on to explain his feelings of not belonging – being gay and Jewish, and making art that was roundly criticized at the time.

Following the session, the two talked privately and shook hands. And as everyone exited they received a mug that had been specially designed by the artist for the occasion – a generic white coffee cup, printed with a stream-of-consciousness text in blue. And the artist stood at the door with a Sharpie, happily personalizing and signing the bottom of each cup for the recipient.

My mother is a collector of quotes and this is one: "We leave traces of ourselves wherever we go, on whatever we touch." I encourage you to think about the traces we as a church wish to leave in the future. I look forward to hearing your ideas and vision as we work together towards the next 100 years.

## Juxtaposition

The renowned Lutheran scholar Gordon Lathrop claims that one of the many amazing things about Christian worship is how we set this next to that, what he calls “juxtaposition.” We set Sunday next to the other six days of the week, for instance. We set the preaching of the word next to the table. We set the rhythms of Advent and Lent next to Santa Claus and March Madness, respectively. This set next to that.

I was struck by his observation once again last Sunday morning during the early worship service. Because it was a day to thank the congregation for all their service, there was a latte machine hissing in the background as Carla welcomed folks to church that morning. But even on other mornings, there are those who ride their bicycles to that early outdoor service, while others sit on blankets with the family dog. This set next to that. It’s like Starbucks, Shakespeare in the Park, and Sunday worship all rolled into one.

And it’s not just the outdoor service during the summer months. Every Sunday morning the preacher of the day dares to set a story from the Scriptures next to the time a dear uncle was hospitalized or tasting some amazing ice cream recently. Preachers set everyday stories next to the ones in the Bible, and no one bats an eye. That’s because properly understood, there is no distinction between sacred and secular. Well, there is nowadays, but that’s a modern construction.

Our ancestors in the faith considered pretty much everything sacred because God’s creation is good, a doctrine backed up with Jesus becoming flesh. They also thought of everything as secular too, if by that term we mean fleshly. Bread and wine, like cookies and cream, is material, not some spiritual nothingness. This doesn’t mean they didn’t recognize some spots at hotter than others, to use a modern Wi-Fi analogy, but everything was and is both ordinary and extraordinary for those with eyes to see.

So if your favorite thing about Sunday worship is the pipe organ, I get that. Or maybe the table set with gorgeous gold ware. If you’re at the outdoor service, crane your neck some time and take in the intricacies of the architecture. It’s breathtaking, to be sure. But it could be the coffee in the parlor is your favorite thing. Or maybe a high five from that youngster holding a cookie in the other hand. As the saying goes, it’s all good. This set next to that.
