Lent Begins with Ash Wednesday

Feb. 10, 6:00 p.m. Sanctuary

The season of Lent is a 40-day period (not including Sundays) that runs from Ash Wednesday to Easter. Over the centuries, Christians of all denominations have developed specific and varied traditions during this period.



Almost uniformly, though, this season of the Church year brings the expectation of self-examination and personal growth toward the celebration of Easter. Some people give something up, while others might concentrate on some sort of learning experience. The options are as varied as the denominations.

The standard scripture readings for Ash Wednesday call us to turn away from that which separates us from the Divine and re-consecrate ourselves to a more spiritual life. For that reason, we usually culminate our worship by the imposing of ashes upon an individual's forehead or on the back of their hands. Join us on Ash Wednesday, Feb. 10, at 6:00 p.m. in the Sanctuary for a traditional imposition of ashes. Dr. Meredith Holladay will preach "We All Fall Down."

Lenten Sermon Series: Last Words

The last words from the cross demand our attention. "Forgive them," Jesus prays. Another who is being crucified calls out to Jesus, "Remember me." In pain and agony our Lord demands, "My God, why?" 2015 Christmas Offering Raises More Than \$27,000

This 2015 Christmas offering raised \$27,253 as of Jan. 21, which was directed to Week of Compassion's relief projects, the Syrian refugee crisis in the Middle East and Europe. The United Nations has said this is the largest refugee crisis since World War II.

Hundreds of thousands of refugees from Syria, Afghanistan, Eritrea, Iraq and Somalia are flooding into Greece, Serbia and Hungary.

The refugees arrive with nothing but the clothes on their backs. Families are sheltering on open beaches waiting for registration and help. Winter is coming and they need warm clothing, shelter and food.

Week of Compassion is working with the World Council of Churches and other partners to provide aid to not only the refugees arriving in Europe, but those arriving in Lebanon, Jordan, and Turkey as well. Thank you for your generous support of the Christmas offering.

Make a joyful noise unto the Lord ...Psalm 100

I'm not a very good singer. But just because I'm not good at it doesn't mean I don't enjoy or appreciate singing. During a recent solo driving trip, I found that the longer I was in the car, the more I sang . . . and sang. (The trip repertoire was a mix of Robert Shaw's *Songs of Angels* and Billboard Top Ten from my high school years.) And because I was anticipating loved ones at both ends of the trip, my singing definitely qualified as a joyful noise – a reflection of gratitude for special people, great traveling weather, and a safe trip.

Here at Country Club Christian Church, we want to encourage a singing congregation, with each person expressing their faith musically, and actively participating in the worship service. Paul Tucker, Glen Miles and I have a standing weekly meeting. We debrief regarding the previous Sunday, and then look farther down the road to coordinate music with the message. There are a couple of resources that I use in anticipation of those meetings. One of them is "David's Bible." Owned by David Diebold, who has very kindly loaned it to us, it's not really a Bible. It's a *Chalice Hymnal* that David got at a conference after the hymnal was first published. In it are signatures and well-wishes from other Disciple musicians – many of the notations are on the front and back inside covers, but others are on the page of specific hymns. In some cases they are favorite hymns of the signee, and in others the signee was the composer of the hymn.

Acknowledging the important sentimental value, there is another reason the book is special. That hymnal reflects your institutional music memory since the *Chalice Hymnal* was adopted. David carefully notated the date each hymn was used on its respective page. This is particularly helpful to Paul and me because we know immediately what is and is not part of the congregation's hymn repertoire.

There are church members who have been in contact with Paul and me regarding the Sunday morning hymns – some like to look at the hymns ahead of time and study the history/background of each. Another likes to print out the hymns in a larger size font, so they are easier to read. If you find that this information would be helpful, please let me know: dinae@cccckc.org.

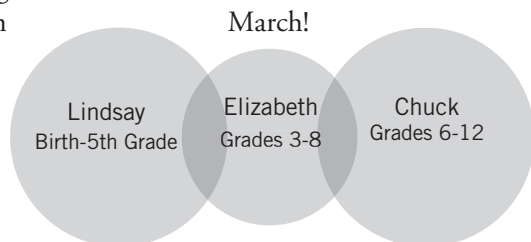

Lederhosen or Kilt?

I love that TV commercial where Kyle talks about believing his family was German but discovers (thanks to Ancestry.com) that he's actually Scots-Irish.

That funny, sentimental 60 seconds reminds us that we humans have always intermingled, sharing dreams and discoveries and DNA. We are richer for the experiences of interactions between peoples and cultures.

As disciples we are called to be “out there” interacting with our neighbors. After all, if you really want to hear and respond to Jesus’ call to love your neighbor, you have to get to know your neighbor.

In recent weeks some of our members, friends and partners have been blessed with opportunities to be part of diverse peoples gathered for fellowship and learning. For instance, the Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City hosted the Kansas City Public Schools Partnerships Forum. We spent a morning exploring how businesses, neighborhoods and organizations can better support quality education for all the children of our community. Another example was the Greater Kansas City Chamber of Commerce’s Racial Equity Forum where Prof. John A. Powell challenged us to “a conscious effort to create a space that makes others feel like they belong.”

Such events are a slightly different and important facet of our service alongside people living in poverty and our partnerships. Rather than going to “do” something, in such conversations we can just “be” together and experience one another as beloved children of God.

Of events on the horizon, here are three that look particularly helpful:

- On Sat., Feb. 6, the Kauffman Foundation Conference Center is hosting the 4th Annual Community Development Workshop. We already have folks signing up for this workshop (<http://bit.ly/1OLx482>)
- Project Equality is sponsoring “From Conversation to Collaboration” on Fri., Feb. 19. (<http://projectequality.org>)
- The National Convocation is our Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) organization representing African-American congregations. The Convocation is having its North American meeting here July 21-24 at the Sheraton Overland Park Hotel. (<http://nationalconvocation.org>)

Imagine how our congregational life and mission might be enriched if each of us made a commitment to attend one or two diverse conversations a year and bring back our insights to share in Sunday School classes, ministry meetings, or over coffee in the Parlor.
