Finding Our Way to Easter

The singular truth that guides our Easter celebrations is this: if there is no death there can be no resurrection. Too often we want to skip Good Friday, making our way to the bunnies and the flowers and the chocolate without facing the ugliness of that terrible day. When we do that we miss Easter, we miss the power of the story to change us, to take the worst in your life and mine and transform it into something new and wonderful.

This truth guides us in our life and our actions. God's love carries us through death by the power of grace. How can we remember this? We need to stay close to the cross.

Pastors and spiritual directors who help people live their faith will remind them that when we are standing in the shadow of the cross it is much harder to be ungracious and unkind to others. It is hard to refuse to forgive others when we stand in front of the cross and hear Jesus say, "Forgive them..."

This promise tells us that the resurrection can transform the ugliest part of us and turn it into something new. Easter faith can take whatever is dead in you and bring it back to life. Resurrection has the power to transform Hell and turn it into a sanctuary where there is grace for the soul.

Even Hell cannot stop the power of God's amazing grace. A common question in the first 100 years of the church was this, "Where was Jesus during the days between his crucifixion and his resurrection?" He was in Hell preaching to the souls there.

Peter is the one who tells us this in his letter at the end of the New Testament. Jesus descended into Hell and preached to the psuches there. Psuche is the Greek word for souls. Jesus was in Hell preaching to the souls there.

This story tells us the church, since its earliest days, has proclaimed there is no place, there is no corner of creation, not even Hades where God has not gone. There are no forgotten people, no overlooked valleys or mountains.

Jesus has gone before us, he has faced death and suffering, loneliness and abandonment. He has gone to Hell and will go again and again, to bring us, all of us, to the gracious presence of God.

Tell Me a Story

In the summer of 2010, a man named Brandon set out to photograph 10,000 New Yorkers for a blog. He thought it would be cool to plot their photos on a map. But when he started this experiment, a curious thing happened. As he'd chat with each stranger whose photo he was taking, he realized they all had stories to tell. He started including snippets of their conversations alongside their photos on his blog, and then an amazing thing happened.

Nearly six years later, Brandon has taken thousands of photos and shared thousands of stories through his blog, Humans of New York (HONY) and its companion social media sites. He has traveled the world telling the stories of people in places like Iran, Boston (after the 2013 marathon bombing), and parts of Europe where migrants and refugees are seeking safe haven from their war-torn homelands. He has spearheaded campaigns that have raised hundreds of thousands of dollars to support philanthropic endeavors associated with individuals he has met along his adventures.

With more than 8 million followers, Brandon has created something of a cultural phenomenon. And it all started with telling simple stories, giving voices to random people throughout the world.

We all love a good story. We humans use narrative to both express ourselves and identify with others. Stories help illustrate who we are, where we come from, what we believe, and so much more.

One of my goals this year in providing effective communication for the church is to tell better stories. We have a tendency to get caught up in the who, what, when and where of things. Maybe we don't spend enough time in the why?

With credit to Brandon and HONY, we've started borrowing his concept to tell you a little more about the humans of Country Club Christian Church. During the season of Lent, you may have noticed that on the church's Facebook page we featured photos of our Pastors' Class students and, in their own words, their stories about what their faith means to them. We also featured some of their adult mentors who told us what it meant to stand with our students during this important time.

I hope you saw and enjoyed these photos and stories. We have more planned; the next series will feature our high school students as they prepare for their Nicaragua mission trip. My goal is that through these personal narratives, we will all enjoy a richer understanding of this faith community we share.

Faith and Grief, New Luncheon

Grief doesn't own a watch.

The loss of a loved one or friend may have been very recent and your grief may be very immediate and intense. Or you may have lost someone years ago and an anniversary or similar event has reawakened that pain.

Our new Faith and Grief Lunch Ministry offers a safe place for those who grieve to remember, listen, and pray together. Participants gather around tables for a simple box lunch and sharing guided by a trained facilitator. You may attend one time or for as long as you find the lunch helpful. The meal begins at noon and ends promptly at 1:00 p.m., making it accessible for those who work. Lunches are offered the first Tuesday of every month beginning Apr. 5. Everyone is welcome – those of all faiths as well as those who profess no spiritual beliefs. The lunch is free, provided by the sponsoring churches. A free will offering basket is available for those who wish to support this ministry.

The ministry is a collaboration of five churches – St. Andrew's Episcopal, St. John's United Methodist, Second Presbyterian, Village Presbyterian, and Country Club. Lunches are hosted at Village Presbyterian Church, 6641 Mission Road, Prairie Village.

Way More Similar

“They are way more similar to us than different.”

Lucy Lehoczky’s observation from her 2013 mission in Nicaragua caught my ear; it was almost verbatim the journal entry I had made for this column. Lucy and Monica Lewis and I were having coffee at The Roasterie, talking about Lucy’s experiences on our student mission in 2013 and planning for her participation as an adult mentor for this summer’s trip.

I asked Lucy to say a little more about what she meant. “The trip to Nicaragua showed me,” Lucy continued,

“that even though our environments, income levels, or languages are different, we have many, many more similarities than we do differences. I think it’s important to recognize this, because it helps to humanize others, whether they are in Colorado, Nicaragua or Syria.”

Exactly. When we spend time with one another, we know in our hearts that we are one human family. That leads to a more immediate and intimate concern for what happens to each other. In turn, that influences our daily decisions (great and small) toward the more compassionate and inclusive choices available. Jesus called that trajectory, “The Way.”

So what did that blooming compassion mean for Lucy? “It was during my trip to Nicaragua,” Lucy explained, “that I fell in love with the Spanish-speaking developing country. After my visit to Nicaragua, I knew that I wanted to study abroad in a Spanish-speaking developing country in Central or South America. After Nicaragua and Peru, I now want to work in a Spanish-speaking developing country as a doctor.”

It seems more than fair to say that Lucy’s mission – at least in some part – helped her discover her vocational path. In the corporate world, that cause and effect is known as “productivity.” In organizational language, it is an “outcome.” In church, we recognize this as a “Call,” a response to the Spirit’s prompting and a blessing for which we can all be profoundly grateful.

God willing, in 2019 we may be back at The Roasterie with one of the students from this summer’s Nicaragua Mission, hearing about how the trip helped her/him discover their Call.


MOPS Group
