On Mystery

Theologians distinguish between two broad streams of thinking about God – kataphatic and apophatic. You can't use these in Scrabble, but they are worth knowing. The former focuses on what can be known about God, whereas the latter stresses what can't be known. We live our lives somewhere in the middle of course, and in the West leaning more toward certainty than mystery.

But every once in a while something happens beyond explanation. Two weeks ago I went out one

afternoon to play golf, getting paired up with three guys I didn't know. After a few holes, one of them asked what I do. When I told him I'm a seminary professor, he shared with me that he's a pastor. I'm always up for talking shop, so I asked, "Where did you do your seminary work?" Believe it or not, that's a risky question these days because while everyone I know prefers their physician to be educated, not all churches require that of their clergy. Thankfully, he had been to seminary, Dallas Theological Seminary to be exact.

What a small world, I thought, because the person who was most influential in me going to seminary, albeit a different one, had attended Dallas Theological. When I asked what years he had attended, I couldn't believe it – about the same time as my mentor. "Did you happen to know Rick Dunham?" He said he did, and the next thing I know we were exchanging email addresses so he could send me contact information. Then I told my new golfing buddy how it was I came to be called to ministry.

I was a sophomore in college, and one Wednesday in the summer of 1978, I had gone to Rick and Judi's house before heading to the church for a Bible study that evening. Rick said he needed to look over his notes, and when he plopped down on the couch beside me, he opened up a Greek New Testament. I was instantly intrigued, asked if I could look at it, and the next thing I know the words coming out of my mouth were, "Do you think God would let me learn Greek?" I have no idea why I asked that question, but the next day I started learning Greek and taught myself quite a bit of it before I ever got to seminary. That's definitely apophatic!

Equally unexplainable, the home that Rick and his wife were renting that summer belonged to a professional golfer who was away on tour, Kermit Zarley. And here I was all these years later, reliving it all on a golf course. I have no words for some things that happen in our lives. Except maybe,

Letting Go of Expectations

Lao Tzu, the eastern philosopher proclaimed hundreds of years ago: "If you do not change direction, you may end up where you are heading." On the surface, this statement seems matter-of-fact; if you don't deviate from the path you have chosen, you will end up exactly where you are intending to go. Yet, as is often the case in philosophy and in life, things are rarely exactly what they appear. In this instance, it is my opinion that Lao Tzu is trying to tell us something about expectations.

Is there a more "expecting" time in the church than Easter? There is an expectation that there will be baptisms on Palm Sunday, a brunch on Easter morning, and three services in the sanctuary filled with a meaningful message, the scent of lilies, and the songs of our choir. But what if one of those expectations was not met? What if you think that the brunch was not as good as last year or that there were not many children on the lawn for the Easter Egg Hunt? Would it distract you?

My fear, and I believe the fear of Lao Tzu, is that expectations not being met can mar our appreciation of our world. We, as opinionated people, latch on to all the wrongs or not-quite-rights or breaches of tradition and in the process lose sight of the real point to the Easter season: the story of the resurrection.

Letting go of expectations is a hard task (especially for me!), but by releasing them it allows us to fully appreciate the world around us and to experience the Easter story like it is the very first time. To continue the metaphor, to get to where we need to go, we sometimes need to take a detour, go the "scenic route" and experience things not according to plan.

After all, no one was expecting Jesus to leave the tomb all those years ago. If he did not change direction, where would we be now?

2017 Easter Offering

This year's Easter Offering will be used to give hope and a lift to two communities that are homeless: veterans in our community and families in Haiti whose homes were destroyed by Hurricane Matthew.

Locally, the Veteran's Community Project is working to build a community of tiny houses that will be provided to homeless veterans. The tiny houses will provide more than shelter and an address. They will provide a community of support and hope for a better future. Half of our Easter offering will be given to this tiny house project. \$15,000 will build and furnish a tiny house and provide utilities and other services for a veteran for a year.

Last September a community of 30 families in Haiti was almost completely destroyed by Hurricane Matthew, leaving 200 plus people without shelter. House of Hope has been providing food and helping with temporary shelter while helping the community rebuild. They need our support to help supply building materials for this effort. House of Hope is a priority project of Global Ministries.

Together in a New Way

I had never been to Kansas City. A vivacious and beautiful young single woman in a brown Oldsmobile sedan picked me up from the airport. The next thing I knew I was seated at a restaurant on the Plaza and there was a large Texas state flag hanging on the wall behind our table. For two days I met with various committees from the church. They packed a lot of the saints onto those committees. People like John Tilton and Mildred Schooling, both of whom I'm pretty

sure were close personal friends of Jesus. Six weeks later, on Labor Day weekend of 1988, I moved to Kansas City to work at this amazing church as the Minister to Single Adults.

I was the first singles minister, the first woman minister, and the only staff person in the building with a computer on her desk (there was one in the finance office but no one seemed to know much about how it worked). I am pretty sure I didn't know what to do next but we made it up as we went along. We started after-school programs in the urban core, we built Habitat Houses in Guatemala, we held dances in the median of Ward Parkway with live music, we subtly played matchmaker in Sunday school and then smiled as singles got married and had children. On my first day on the job, Senior Minister Gene Brice said, "I want you to have fun." And fun we did have!

I couldn't have imagined back then that 28 years later I would still be working at the same church. Nor could I have imagined that the people here could have taught me so much about what it means to follow Jesus. It has been my privilege to stand before dear friends as they said "I do" and to carry longed-for new borns down the aisle to receive God's blessing. We have wept together at bedsides and gravesides. We prayed at ground zero and at the continental divide. There have been more than enough committee meetings along the way. We have studied scripture and theology and learned how to meditate and contemplate.

Now the Spirit has called us together in a new way. I am humbled by the opportunity to serve as the eighth Senior Minister of this historic and forward looking congregation. I hope to build upon the outstanding gifts and graces of Glen Miles, Bob Cueni and Gene Brice, all of whom mentored me and believed in me when I wasn't always so sure of myself. I hope to honor the Spirit of the Living God that is alive in the individual people and the collective whole of this congregation. Together we will take risks. We will fall flat on our faces sometimes. And other times we will beam with joy at our success. But then we will know that we have only been a conduit for the grace, the love and the peace of the God we glimpsed in Jesus Christ.
