don't go away."

So we waited. And they didn't go away. So more tests. And more waiting. And more tests. And waiting.

Advent is the season of waiting for four weeks until the baby Jesus arrives on Christmas Eve. This felt longer than that. It was more like waiting for the second coming. Eternal waiting and wondering. Finally, on Good Friday morning, my husband called me to say that what we assumed was nothing, was actually a something, a malignant growth.

So there were more tests and more waiting. It was agony for an impatient planner like me. The happy news is that my husband's cancer has a cure rate of 95% . The unhappy news is that they will "beat up his body" (that is a medical term that the doctors and nurses both use, said with love of course) before he is going to reach that cure. We expect the summer to be filled with some rough patches but that by fall we will be back into our regular patterns of life.

Sad Is Important, Too

R ecently, one of my favorite writers, Newbery Medal-winning author Matt de la Peña, published an op-ed in *Time*, "Why We Shouldn't Shield Children From Darkness." He related an experience where his daughter saw his wife cry. "I couldn't help thinking," he wrote, "a fraction of her innocence had been lost that day. But maybe these minor episodes of loss are just as vital to the well-adjusted child's development as moments of joy. Maybe

instead of anxiously trying to protect our children from every little hurt and heartache, our job is to simply support them through such experiences. To talk to them. To hold them."

It is hard enough to talk to adults about sadness, loss, death, and confusing social interactions. And, it is even harder to talk with children about these topics. Here are four books that I highly recommend for young (and not-so-young) readers. They are available in The Well and I have a copy of each if you would like to flip through them.

Be Kind, Pat Zietlow Miller, Jen Hill (Illustrator)

When a classmate spills purple juice on her dress, our young protagonist tries to be kind, but her gesture does not produce the result she expected. She sets off to explore what it means to be kind. (3 - 6 Years)

Each Kindness by Jacqueline Woodson, E. B. Lewis (Illustrator) A new girl joins our protagonist's class. Day after day our protagonist passes up opportunities to show the newcomer a little kindness. Then, one day, the opportunities are gone. (5 - 8 Years)

The Dead Bird by Margaret Wise Brown, Christian Robinson (Illustrator) From the author of the beloved classic Goodnight Moon comes this story about children playing in a park and discovering a dead bird. The children act on the natural human inclination to honor the life that has been lost through ritual. (4 - 7 Years)

Love by Matt de la Peña, Loren Long (Illustrator)

Gentle prose accompanies our little one from infancy to independence, illuminating love along the way. "And in time you learn to recognize a love overlooked. A slice of burned toast that tastes like love." (4 - 8 Years)

In a companion piece in *Time*, author Kate DiCamillo mused on "Why Children's Books Should Be a Little Sad." A friend told DiCamillo that when she was young she read *Charlotte's Web* over and over, "I knew for a fact that it wasn't going to turn out differently... And I found out that I could bear it... That was what I needed to hear. That I could bear it somehow."

Five Generations of Love

couple of weeks ago, when Carla was preaching about the history of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), my mom passed me a note written on the bulletin: "Your grandmother always said her father was a Campbellite." My great grandfather was a Disciples of Christ minister,

the kind who traveled around preaching at small-town churches in rural Iowa. He followed the teachings of Alexander Campbell, who is commonly associated with the founding of the movement we now recognize as our denomination. His copy of The Marginal Chain-Reference Bible, (copyright 1908, the year before my grandmother was born), its leather cover frayed and worn, sits on my desk.

Over the last few weeks, as we've celebrated our Legacy of Love campaign and looked into the history of our denomination and our church, we have heard from church members who've been here for generations: Bill Hopkins, who has met every senior minister, "from Combs to Carla;" John Stewart and Shelle Jensen, who represent three generations; Jeff and Kristi Gibbs, whose family has deep roots here; Jeff Zimmerman and his granddaughter, Amelia Hicks, who was just baptized with the 2018 Pastors' Class.

As I was thinking about my own family, I realized that my daughter, Caroline, is a fifth generation Disciple. At age 13, that is probably meaningless to her, but to me it represents a Legacy of Love passed down from our ancestors. I picture Rev. John Harris traveling from town to town sharing the good news of God's grace. I recall my grandmother filling communion trays in the darkened sacristy. I see my dad singing in the choir and my mom becoming our home church's first female deacon. I remember being taught that God loves and calls us to love, and God forgives, and if you know these things, that's pretty much all you need to know.

Today, I watch Caroline know that God's grace is alive and powerful, and meant for all people, and I am moved and grateful for this legacy. What is God if not the gift of being loved, and learning to love, shared among family?

Circles of Care will provide more consistent opportunities for our Elders and Deacons to develop prayerful relationships with our homebound members. As Circle members get to know their homebound member and one another, they will be better equipped to pray together and to be aware of the changing circumstances of our elderly or infirm member.

"I am really excited about the new Circles of Care," says Greg Lear, Co-Chair of the Congregational Care Ministry Team, "because this will allow Elders and Deacons to form an ongoing relationship with someone in our congregation who is not able to be at church."

Elders and Deacons may choose to organize themselves into a particular Circle by signing up on the charts in the parlor. Elders and Deacons may elect to serve in more than one Circle. The remaining Elders and Deacons will be provided a Circle assignment. To the extent possible, requests for a Circle to call on a particular elderly or infirm member will be honored. 
Tall Oaks Summer Camps
