od said to Abraham, "Go from your father's house to the land that I will show you." So Abraham went in search of this socalled land of milk

and honey. And God said to Moses, "Bring my people out of Egypt." And Moses at first resisted, but eventually led the people through the Red Sea to freedom. Migration of groups of people across the globe has been unfolding for thousands of years, maybe since the beginning of human history. So today when we read about the complex controversies swirling in the public dialogue related to migration from the south and from the east, we are not reading about a new challenge.

The question of how to co-exist haunted the folks in the Bible as well. Ancient Israelites wondered if they should intermarry and adopt the customs of the local inhabitants. And Jesus shocked the religious elites by reaching out to those everyone assumed were unholy: women, foreigners, those of ill repute.

Last night at Vacation Bible School the children were taught the meaning of the word refugee and what our church does to prepare homes for those arriving in Kansas City. The teacher used Lego blocks and toy

figurines to explain the journey from war-torn nation, to tent city, to new homeland. Then the children sorted packets of children's clothes for the refugees and drew handmade cards to welcome newly arrived refugees. Two of the children spontaneously walked over towards the packets of clothing and carefully tucked their hand drawn notes under the rubber band that held the packets of clothing together. And when the teacher left the room, one of the children went over and picked up the toy children and gently placed them inside the lego house, tucking them carefully into the beds.

God must have known what God was doing when God sent a child to lead us. For through the hearts of children, our hearts are made pliable again. And we are compelled to seek solutions for the common good that begin with the law of love.

Renowned Organist to Perform in Sanctuary



Organist Christopher Houlihan will perform in the Sanctuary on Tues., July 3 at 2:00 p.m. Houlihan has performed at Disney Concert Hall with principal brass of the Los Angeles

Philharmonic; the Kimmel Center in Philadelphia and at the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C. He was appointed to the John Rose College Organist-and-Directorship Distinguished Chair of Chapel Music at Trinity College in Hartford, CT, in 2017, succeeding his teacher John Rose. He was previously artist-in-residence at Trinity, as well as Director of Music and Organist at the Church of the Holy Apostles in Manhattan.

The concert, featuring music of Robert Schumann, Herbert Howells, and César Franck, is underwritten by the James and Carlene Neihart Family in memory of Carlene Neihart.



Mrs. Neihart received a bachelor's degree in piano and organ from Pittsburg State and a master's degree from KU. She attended Eastman School of Music and coached privately

with French organists Andre' Marchal and Jean Langlais. Throughout her concert career, Mrs. Neihart performed 400+ recitals throughout Canada, Europe, and the U.S., including six AGO conventions. She also served several Kansas City congregations including St. Andrew's Episcopal; Central Presbyterian; Unity on the Plaza; and the New Reform Temple.

The concert is one of two that will be livestreamed during the AGO convention. Tickets will be available at the door for \$20, cash only.

Beautiful Fear

ou have probably held a door open for a stranger on countless occasions. Most of the time you received a polite "thank you" or an appreciative head nod. What about those times when your kindness was ignored or the person grumbled something under their breath? That felt a little awkward, didn't it? But it didn't stop you from holding a door the next time the opportunity presented itself, right? The occasional rebuff is just part of the cost of paying attention to those

around you and being kind to them.

When we think about Jesus modeling for us how to be loving, the first step in his interactions with individuals was that he cared enough to turn his attention towards them. Jesus felt the hemorrhaging woman's hand brush his garment even in a jostling crowd. Jesus heard the plea of the blind beggar over the chatter of his disciples and the hangers on. Jesus saw the pain on the face of the Samaritan woman at the well even in a social context where they were forbidden to look at one another. Every miracle, every healing conversation began with the simple and accessible – and courageous – step of loving attention.

"Courageous?"

Absolutely. To care enough to enter into someone's story means we voluntarily become vulnerable to wherever the interaction leads. I often recall the story of The Rich Young Man in this vein. In addition to his financial wealth, Jesus was calling him to surrender the privilege and power he used to control the outcome of most social interactions.

When we befriend an elderly neighbor by helping with little chores or errands we know that someday they will move away - or die - and we will miss them because we have let them into our hearts. Such is the nature of life. When we speak up on behalf of immigrant children our heart aches as if they were our own children. That national crisis may be resolved compassionately— or not. Such is the nature of history.

So we may reasonably fear the possible consequences and costs of loving. At the same time, we believe that we are made in God's own image and so we cannot be true to the Spirit that beats in our heart or to our very being without daring to care. A friend recently summed it up this way, "If we ignore or tamp down all the bad stuff, we miss all the good stuff, too."

Our congregation offers a rich variety of ways to engage in caring for and with one another. For instance, next month we will be inviting members and guests to learn more about our Stephen Ministry and how to become a trained caregiver. You are also invited to join one of our new Circles of Care and enjoy meeting one of our homebound members. And we will soon be rolling out a new opportunity to offer an occasional ride to an elderly member or neighbor through the Jewish Family Services JET Express project.

Jesus has shown us that The Way leads through our fears to an ever greater awareness of our capacity to love, to serve, to sacrifice, to laugh with and cry with one another. T
