Dr. Miles Nominated as Moderator of General Assembly

Dr. Miles has been nominated to be Moderator of the General Assembly of the Disciples of Christ. The Moderator serves a two-year term beginning this July. The Moderator Team includes the Moderator, the Moderator-Elect, and two Vice-Moderators. The team partners with the General Minister and President to guide the church during a biennium.



The term of service begins at the close of the assembly, where the Moderator is elected and culminates at the ensuing General Assembly. The team works closely with the senior staff of the Office of the General Minister and President to ensure the Administrative Committee, General Board and General Assembly provide leadership for the denomination as outlined in The Design for the Christian Church.

As a primary advisor to the General Minister and President, the Moderator offers spiritual support, wise counsel and practical insight into the leadership of the denomination. The Moderator presides at meetings of the Administrative Committee, General Board and General Assembly, functioning much like the board chair.

The moderator serves as the board chair for the Office of the General Minister and President through leadership of the Administrative Committee, which serves the dual function of the smaller body of the General Board and the board of directors for the Office of the General Minister and President.

Special Easter Offering for Healing and Hope

Live at Peace with All

The apostle Paul wrote to the church in Rome, “If it is possible, so far as it depends on you, live at peace with all.” This instruction is clear but it comes with an “if.” “If it is possible.” Paul knows that we are not always able to mend every wound. Every broken relationship cannot be reconciled. Some things will remain damaged.

That truth can be found throughout the Bible. A college student discovered he needed a course in the Bible in order to get his literature degree.

He wrote home to his parents and asked them to mail him his Bible. His dad gently and thoroughly wrapped it and took it to the Post Office. The clerk looked at the carefully wrapped package and asked, “Anything in here that can be broken?” he asked. “Only the Ten Commandments.” Do you know why it is so easy to break them? All of them have something to do with relationship. All of them point to the work that it takes to be in relationship with neighbor, spouse, family or God. Relationships are fragile and easily bruised.

Leonard Sweet asks: “How many relationships can survive the break of health, the wreck of reputation, the remove of riches, the stain of scandal? How many relationships can handle what we might perceive as good news?”

When the lottery prize rises to the hundreds of millions, Julie and I play a game we call, “What we would do if we won the lottery?” Have you ever done that? We start making lists. We name all of the churches and schools we would give money to. We talk about how we would invest it and what trips we would take. Pretty soon, after about 20 minutes of this silly little game, we begin to argue about how much should go to family members and charities. One time we got a little upset. We argued. At some point we both looked at each other and had the exact same thought at the exact same moment: “My goodness, I hope we don’t win!”

You do know, don’t you, that the divorce rate among lottery winners is much higher than the divorce rate for the nation on the whole. Relationships are fragile.

“If it is possible,” Paul writes, “live at peace.” Perhaps the most important thing we can do is begin this work of living at peace with the ones we love the most.

Christ in Unexpected Places

“Raise your hand if you’d like to meet Raul” and all of our kids raised their hands. It shouldn’t have surprised me. After all, our youth had heard stories about Raul since they were 10 years old. They knew about the disease that disfigured his face and stunted his growth. So before we left the hills of Matagalpa, Nicaragua, we scheduled a visit with Raul and his family. They were to meet us at the dirt road, near the school in the village.

When we arrived, Raul and his parents stood at the edge of the barbed wire fence where they’d been waiting for more than an hour. Raul’s dad proudly sported his KC Royals cap. Raul and his mother wore their best Sunday clothes. We embraced. “I want you to meet my son, Connor, and the members of the youth group from our church,” I explained. Our youth eagerly lined up to shake hands and say “Buenas Dias” and “Como Esta?” to Raul and his parents.

I wasn’t exactly sure what to say or do next. We shared a few school supplies and a home health kit for the family but we really had no business to transact. Raul’s family is now under the care of a capable staff person from CEPAD who manages his medical needs through donations from our church. We made small talk and discussed Raul’s health progress and setbacks. Mostly we smiled at each other.

Then it was time to go. “Let’s take some pictures.” As you do at a family reunion, we took various group shots. And then we took one of Connor, me and Raul. Connor is 5’9”. I am 5’3”. And Raul is about 4’10”. But Raul and Connor are the same age. When I look at this photo I am reminded of what Raul’s doctor often says to us, “His biggest medical problem is poverty.”

As we drove away, I pondered this brief visit. Our church has become attached to this family who lives a world away from us. Something about this relationship has brought healing – not just for Raul but for all of us. I cannot quite explain it. Except to say that as we drove down the mountain I remembered what the disciples said after Jesus had risen and walked among them. At first they didn’t recognize him but later they pondered the brief visit: “Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking with us on the road.” (Luke 24:32) Christ rises up, in the most unexpected places, to awaken us to new life.

And, we could validate our mission to care for neighbor as we had been cared for.

My experience this weekend affirms what I believe church and congregational care is. In a safe and caring environment, we create a sacred space where we are able to validate our own humanity and affirm self and one another. Then, with compassion, we are able to help those who are hurting, broken and vulnerable. It is through our brokenness that God provides us opportunities for growth and to care for neighbor.

By the church calendar, Lent is over. But the work of Lent continues. Through the celebration of Easter, we can proclaim the resurrection by renewing our broken spirit into one of hope and compassion for one another. The difficulty of Lent may always be in us, but the hope of Easter Sunday allows for brokenness to be healed. We can create a community of compassion, where we continue to grow and where stranger becomes neighbor.
