What Does God Expect?

There have been times in my life when I wanted to know exactly what God wanted me to do, where to go, which job to take, even silly little things like “should I buy this TV or the other one?” Those decisions would be a lot easier if God would just tell me, in a big booming voice, what to do: “GLEN. BUY THE SONY. IT IS THE BEST.”

I complained like this to one of my professors in seminary, Fred Norris. Norris is brilliant. He holds a Ph.D. from Yale. He’s published lots of books, difficult books, the type of books that only people with Ph.D.’s from Yale can understand. But Fred is also great fun at a party. He’s got a great sense of humor. Follows sports. Reads fun stuff, too.

One day, toward the end of my final semester, I was in his office seeking advice. I had a couple of job offers. Good churches, great ministries, fine places to live. I said, “How do I know what God wants me to do?” Norris laughed (he had this really LOUD laugh), and asked, “Mr. Miles, have you actually read the Bible while you have been in seminary? Are you really in my office asking: ‘What does God want you to do?’” He went on: “Let’s get real clear here: God wants you to love your neighbor as yourself. According to Jesus you are to love God with all your heart, soul and mind. Jesus also said that God expects us to feed the hungry, visit the imprisoned, clothe the naked. Take either job, I don’t care. Go work for Quik Trip selling sodas and candy bars and gasoline but whatever you do don’t forget to love God, to love your neighbor and to care for the least of these.”

Dr. Norris was right. He wasn’t being overly simplistic. He wasn’t avoiding my concerns but he wanted me to think beyond my own little world. He wanted me to look past my worries and follow God’s simple and clear command to love.

When we ask, “what does God expect,” hidden in that question is the desire to see God, to hear God’s voice, to find God and know, really know, that God is alive and present in our lives. Because of that yearning, because of that desire, the authors of the Bible have left us glimpses and hints and clear indicators of where God is. John wrote, “No one has ever seen God; but if we love one another, God lives in us and God’s love is made complete in us.” Jesus said, “Whatever you did for the least of these...you did for me.”

What does God expect? Well, not much really: Love God. Love neighbor. Care for the least of these. When you do, you may even see God.

Commitment to a Vision

I imagined we'd be seeing yet another European-looking church, beautiful but unremarkable. But after a short walk we turned a corner and suddenly there it towered before us, the most awe-inspiring man-made structure I've ever seen. To say one's first glimpse of Sagrada Familia is breathtaking is to understate it by significant measure.

Construction on Sagrada Familia, a Roman Catholic basilica in Barcelona, Spain, commenced in 1882.

One year later, famed Catalan architect Antoni Gaudí took over, injecting it with his distinctive style

and expansive vision. Today, 132 years after ground first broke, the basilica is still under construction. That's right: cranes and workers in hard hats surround the massive structure daily, with completion not expected until 2026. One local we spoke to doubted it would ever be finished.

The sheer size and complexity of the place is extraordinary, with mosaic tiled details, haunting sculpture, and intricate carvings casing its exterior like skin worn and aged in some places; gleaming and new in others. But if I had been thunderstruck by the exterior, the interior nearly brought me to my knees. Rarely am I speechless, but as my friend quietly commented on a stained glass detail here or a stone structure there, I merely nodded. The cacophony of construction mingling with hushed prayers and dulcet organ tones.

Later, I messaged Glen and said it was one of the few times in my life I've truly felt the presence of the Spirit. I also joked that 138 years of construction makes the couple of years we've spent watching the restoration work here at Country Club Christian Church seem like nothing.

All joking aside, I am stunned by the Barcelona community's longstanding commitment to completing the project to Gaudí's specifications. Here in the U.S., I suspect we'd have long ago given up. So while I have been anxious to have the cranes out of the front yard at 6101 Ward Parkway, I've been looking at our construction a little differently these days. I am grateful for our nearly 100-year-old building, its gothic architecture, its decorative detailing. As Sagrada Familia stands for many decades of commitment to a vision, so does Country Club Christian Church. I hope you will join us on Sun., Oct. 5, as we rededicate this beautiful old structure, and offer prayers for 100 more years of standing as a beacon in a world that needs light.


I remembered in that moment, it's God who's ushering in the change—we're just trying our best to listen.
