Pathways to Learning: Early Childhood – Caring For Our Future



Every child is a wondrous sign of God's love expressed in and through humanity; a gift to all of us, entrusted to our love and care.

As individuals, a congregation and a society we reverently accept the responsibility of caring for God's children, be they

our own family, our neighbors or little ones in faraway places. From both experience and science we know that the care – or lack thereof – a child receives in the earliest years directly impacts lifelong health, well-being, and ability to engage fruitfully in society.

On Sun., Sept. 20 and 27 we will offer a two-part Pathways to Learning on "Early Childhood: Caring for Our Future." The presentations will be 10:00-10:50 a.m. in the Social Hall. Everyone is welcome. There is no charge for the sessions.

The Sept. 20 session will explore how access to health care, nutritional food, educational stimulation, and a safe, stable environment nurture essential emotional, physical and social development. We will also hear from a Head Start director about

the day-to-day experiences of local early childhood caregivers.

In the Sept. 27 session we will hear from our outreach and mission partners about ways they are providing for the care and nurture of young children. They will describe programs we are already supporting through our stewardship and share other ways that we can volunteer and provide resources toward our goal of loving care for every child.

Good Books on the Good Book

Many times people say to me, “I don’t know a lot about the Bible. Is there a good book I can read that will help me understand it better?” The answer is yes and here are my top three books on the Good Book.

Making Sense of the Bible, by Adam Hamilton. This book is one of the best you can read about the Bible. Adam has combined a pastor’s heart with a scholar’s background and delivered a terrific guide to many of the complex and difficult questions that surround its contents. In the first section of the book, he takes on topics like inspiration,

how and why the books of the Bible were chosen (and why others were not included), and the nature of scripture. In the second part he deals with contemporary issues like science, suffering, homosexuality and violence. For my money this is the best book available for the person in the pew on how to read and make sense of the sacred and holy word.

An older but still very worthwhile volume is Peter Gomes’ book, *The Good Book: Reading the Bible with Heart and Mind*. Professor Gomes is in the resurrection now but during his lifetime he was named as one of the top ten preachers in the USA. Some of you may recall that he delivered a series of lectures and a sermon here at Country Club Christian Church several years ago. Gomes takes on issues and concerns similar to Hamilton’s but with a slightly different approach. If you’ve ever heard Peter preach you’ll no doubt hear his voice as you read chapters with titles like, “The Bible in America,” “The Bible and Race,” and “The Bible and Mystery.”

Convictions: How I Learned What Matters Most, by Marcus Borg, focuses on the question, “What does it mean to be Christian and American today?” As you can see the book is not about the Bible but it does delve into matters centered around concerns that are raised about the Bible. For example, chapter five, “Jesus is the Norm of the Bible,” is a very practical guide to reading the Bible through the viewpoint of Jesus (and it is similar to an idea proposed in Adam’s book above). Another chapter, “The Bible is Political,” demonstrates that the Bible often took on political issues of the day.

All three of these volumes are worth your time to read. I am certain your faith will be enriched. If you read any or all, please let me know your thoughts. I’d love to be in conversation with you about these good books on the Good Book!

Stephen Ministry Training Begins This Fall

Stephen Ministers are congregation members trained to offer high-quality, one-on-one Christian care to people facing long-term illness, the death of a loved one, loss of a job, divorce, or other life crisis. Do you feel led to explore how you might help provide confidential care to individuals who are experiencing difficulties in their lives? Stephen Ministry may be a good match for you. A new training class begins in September. The 50-hour training sessions and retreats focus on prayer and spirituality, active listening, boundaries awareness, confidentiality, referral strategies, and initiating and concluding caregiving relationships. Help Prepare a Home to Welcome a Refugee Family

We have committed to try to provide teams of three to five people to help prepare each home in the Della Lamb Refugee Resettlement program, a part of our Northeast PartNerShip. If you are interested in helping with this project, please contact Kathy Buckley, the point person for our congregation, at majorbuckley@aol.com. In the last 10 months, Della Lamb has established more than 60 homes for 150 plus individuals who have come to America through the program sponsored by U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services. Della Lamb's first responsibility to these families is to provide an apartment or home.

Prison Book Ministry

We are collecting books for our Lansing Correctional Facility Library Book Ministry. Volunteers from our church go to the prison to help the librarian catalog and stock donated books. Acceptable genres include mysteries, suspense, current best sellers, history, Westerns, science fiction, Spanish language books, and Spanish-English dictionaries. We cannot accept romance novels, *Reader's Digest*, Bibles (we have plenty), or product manuals. Paperback books are preferred though hardback volumes are accepted. Health and Spirituality Keynote



A Heart for Students

“I actually feel like what I am doing is making a difference and that’s a great feeling,” said Deanne Stedem, one of dozens of volunteers from our congregation who have discovered enriching opportunities through our partnership with Hartman Elementary School. Deanne spends an hour each week reading, doing math problems or playing word games with third graders. “I really don’t do very much,” she said. “The students clearly enjoy the extra bit of attention I provide, and I enjoy their excited smiles, and those little ‘ah-

ha’ moments when they learn a word, or suddenly understand a math problem.” Deanne’s sons also volunteer, tutoring math and coaching sports.

Kate Berkley found her niche in the kindergarten class during the summer school program. “I questioned what my role as a reading tutor would be,” she said, “amongst students who are still mastering their ABCs. Quickly, though, I found my place in the class, guiding hands holding pencils as they trace letters on Common Core worksheets, moderating disputes over

who can play quarterback during recess, and explaining that ‘Imno’ is four letters and not one.” Kate, a Kansas City native, is currently a student at Bowdoin College in Brunswick, ME. The past three summers she has returned home to be part of the Local Investment Commission (klinc.org) summer programs in Kansas City schools. Though not a church member, Kate has worked alongside us and we have enjoyed her enthusiasm and appreciated her many gifts and talents.

“Programs like LINC Summer School are vitally important,” Kate said, “to helping young students maintain and continue to make progress during these crucial ages of development. When students leave school for the summer, if they do not practice and continue to develop these new skills, they lose progress made during the school year, and, once a student falls behind, it can be extremely difficult to catch up again.”

Beyond encouraging students, our partnership offers myriad opportunities on-site and through church. We host occasional special events for the teachers and help with afterschool programming. Hartman is a Grace at Work site; we will be beautifying the grounds on Oct. 10. Volunteers meet at our church once a week to fill and deliver backpacks through Harvesters’ BackSnack program. 
