Outreach Funds Help Near and Far

Your Outreach dollars and hands help provide needed help here in the Kansas City area and in places like Afghanistan, Mozambique, Nicaragua and the Congo.

The Outreach Council and the Metro Mission Council are part of Country Club Christian Church's outreach ministry. Both receive funds from Endowment and the church budget. This fiscal year the Outreach Council received \$102,236 in undesignated funds and \$88,861 in restricted or designated funds. Metro Mission received \$15,897.

Metro Mission coordinates funding and volunteers for Cross-Lines Community Outreach, Micah Ministries, Collection Connection, Grace at Work, Hartman School, the Prison Book Ministry, the Tutoring Ministry and the Virginia Reed Food Drive. Metro Mission can be thought of as the hands-on part of our outreach beyond our own congregation. The work of Metro Mission would not be possible without dedicated and hard-working leaders and volunteers. Each of the ministries supported by Metro Mission was started by individuals wanting to make a difference and with a vision of how the church could help with that mission. Tom and Cindy Thornton are chairs of the Metro Mission Council and Rev. Carla Aday is the staff representative.

The Outreach Council receives and analyzes grant requests from local charitable organizations and our Global Ministries partners overseas. During the past year funding was provided for 16 local charitable agencies, five Global Ministries projects, and our sponsored

missionaries, Reverends Dawn and Jon Barnes. In addition, \$79,764 was provided to support our national denominational ministries. Members of the committee contact leaders of local organizations requesting grants and often visit the requesting organizations as well to get a sense of the work that the requesting agency is doing and to determine whether to recommend to the council that a grant be made. Not every request for funds is granted, and

often those that are granted funds only receive partial grants. The committee works hard to see that your outreach dollars are used wisely and prudently. The Outreach Council also selects recipients for and promotes the Christmas and Easter offerings. Lance Jessee is Chair of the Outreach Council and Dr. Glen Miles is the staff representative.

If you would like to become involved in either of these outreach ministries, or to just learn more about them you are invited to attend their regular meetings. The Outreach Council meets on the first Tuesday of the month, and Metro Mission meets bimonthly on the third Wednesday of the month.

New Landscape Master Plan

Guided by a group of members from the Green Team and the Design Team, the church is creating a new landscape master plan that will guide our landscaping for the next 10-20 years. The upcoming repairs to the church exterior require removal of much of the existing landscaping. Our last landscape master plan was done in 1989 and many of those plantings are showing age.

The master plan is being developed by the Landscape Architecture firm Vireo (formerly Patti Banks Associates), which is known for sustainable design.

A landscaping master plan goes beyond enhancing the beauty of our church. Perhaps you remember storm water running in the basement not long ago. Our landscape architect will create a plan for the great amount of water that comes from the roof of our church.

The team has asked for a plan that is sustainable – that means reduced watering, reduced mowing and trimming, and reduced overall maintenance. Existing plants will be kept if possible, transplanted and thinned as needed. Further "recycling" is planned by reusing broken architectural elements from the building repair into a gargoyle garden.

The landscaping will remain classic and respectful of the beautiful architecture of the church. We hope the new plan makes the landscaping not only inviting to wildlife but helps the church welcome neighbors and the surrounding neighborhood.

passages from the senior minister

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Sin Boldly!

A young man visited the great theologian, Martin Luther. This man was worried that he may be committing a sin without knowing it. He was concerned that he may be sent to eternal fire for something he didn't even realize he was doing wrong. This poor guy had almost no faith. He lived in fear. Luther could hardly contain himself. He looked right at him and said, "SIN BOLDLY MY SON, SIN BOLDLY!"

What is Luther's point? A life lived in fear of committing some little sin is no life at all. Lu-

ther, like Jesus, wants us to see that God is not some heavenly bookkeeper, sitting with pencil sharpened, keeping track of every little slip up. Luther's command to sin boldly was not a direction to live immorally but rather an invitation to live life to its fullest.

Back in my youth ministry days I told that story in the pulpit. A mom, whose obnoxious little 11 year old was a member of our Christian Kids Fellowship, did not like the story. She complained and said, "You've given Johnny permission to sin." I said, "Up to this point in his life Johnny has not needed my permission to be a brat!"

The grace of God is not heavenly permission to live a life of immorality. It is a call to live as the one that God created us to be. It is a sign that God will go after us, chase us down if necessary, even in the midst of sin, just to tell us that we are loved.

Kathleen Norris, author of the book, *Amazing Grace*, isn't so sure that we want a God like this. She writes:

"One so often hears people say, 'I just can't handle it,' when they reject a biblical image of God as Father, as Mother, as Lord or Judge; God as Lover, as angry or jealous, God on a cross. I find this choice of words revealing, however real the pain they reflect: if we seek a God we can 'handle,' that will be exactly what we get. A God we can manipulate, suspiciously like ourselves, the wideness of whose mercy we've cut down to size."

She's right. We don't need a safe God. We need one who is larger and holier than ourselves. Maybe, when we live in faith and not fear, we we will discover the blessing that is waiting for all of us.

Community Camp Kansas City Happening in June


Wednesday evenings in June
