Emergency Funding to Gaza Hospital

The Outreach Council voted unanimously at its Jan. 6 meeting to grant \$5,000 in emergency funding to the Al-Ahli Hospital in Gaza. Al-Ahli is located in the Gaza strip area of Palestine. It is an 80-bed unit providing both in-patient and out-patient services.



Due to the recent conflict in the area, the hospital is facing severe financial constraints in attempting to meet the needs of an increasing numbers of patients and to deal with the physical damage to the building from the recent bombings.

Unemployment in the Gaza Strip has reached 70 percent and many of the patients who used to pay their fees for treatment are often now unable to do so. The hospital is having trouble

paying its regular employees, as well as the additional emergency personnel currently needed. In addition to its hospital facility, Al-Ahli offers mobile clinics in villages of the Gaza Strip on a monthly basis.

The hospital is part of the service ministry of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem and is supported by our Global Ministries initiative. In conjunction with the plea for financial support, the National Interreligious Leadership Initiative for Peace wrote to President George W. Bush to urge immediate action to stop the violence and resume peace talks.

The Outreach Council felt the congregation should be aware of this emergency response.

The Gospel of Love and Service

Paul reminds the church in Philippi, that “Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God...emptied himself, taking the form of a slave.” This a reminder to all of us in the church whether we are ministers, elders, board members, council chairs, active members, first-time visitors or curious seekers that we are called to serve one another.

I find it quite interesting that Paul chooses to respond to a practical problem in the church with a big theological answer. These folks are

resorting to petty little jealousies and arguments. However, rather than scold or lecture, Paul gives them a huge dose of theology.

Paul wants them to remember that their childish behavior can cause them to forget the central event of their faith, the cross. When we keep the cross before us, we continue to remind ourselves of the very fact that Christ, in the name of love, gave himself, in the name of love, to the world. When the most powerful army in the world tortured him he refused to return violence with violence. When the cross is central to all that we do, we will be constantly reminded that the only path before the church is the way named love.

That path is not always the easiest one to follow. We can easily forget Christ's example and seek the ways of power while forgetting about love. If we follow Christ we must allow love and an attitude of service to guide all that we do.

An Indian woman, a Christian, came to Mother Teresa for help. Her neighbor, a Hindu woman, was hungry. She had been without food for days. Mother Teresa brought food to the Hindu woman. She, in turn, decided to share half of what she had received with her neighbor, a Muslim. That day—from a Christian, to a Hindu, to a Muslim—the Gospel of Love and Service was proclaimed.

The same thing is true in our families. Tony Campolo was leading a seminar on relationships when he was interrupted near the end by one of the students who said, “Dr. Campolo, you haven't answered the question, ‘Who is supposed to be the head of the household, the husband or the wife?’ ” Campolo replied, “The mature Christian never asks who is going to be the master but always asks: ‘Where is Christian service needed?’ ”

A Valuable Reference

In college I took several journalism classes taught by curmudgeonly professor Dr. Tom Dickson. A requirement for Dr. Dickson's classes was a book entitled *The Associated Press Stylebook and Libel Manual*. I hated this book. We were quizzed on it constantly, and if we so much as drafted a sentence without following its rules, Dr. Dickson could smell it. He relished any opportunity to strike points off our grades should we dare to not follow the manual. Dr. Dickson's favorite rule was on page 44: the appropriate uses for the words *compose*, *comprise* and *constitute*. ("Just

avoid using comprise," he lectured. "No one ever uses it correctly.") I couldn't wait for the last day of my last class with him so I could banish the *Stylebook*, never to be seen again.

It's been 15 years since my last class with Dr. Dickson, but guess what? That darn *Associated Press Stylebook* is still sitting on my desk. Its pages are yellowed, and I should buy a new copy given mine is a June 1994 edition. But this old edition has sentimental value, kind of the way my first Bible, a gift from my home church, does. In fact, I call my *Stylebook* my writer's bible. I refer to it every day for guidance.

In addition to the *Stylebook*, on my desk now I also have a copy of *The New Oxford Annotated Bible*, and one other publication that I use about a dozen times each day, the new issue of Country Club Christian Church's *Ministries and Events Guide*. By now you should have received your copy of this guide to the church's upcoming events and activities. If you haven't, or you'd like an extra to give to a friend, pick up a copy at the church. I encourage you to look through the guide now, then refer to it regularly in the coming months. The dates and times for the church's upcoming special events are included, as well as information about Sunday School classes, Children's and Youth Ministries, visitor information, and much more about all the dynamic ministries this church comprises. The guide's organization makes it easy to find what you're looking for, and there's also an alphabetical index in the back and a calendar listing of events for quick reference.

I hope you'll find the *Ministries and Events Guide* a helpful and constant companion in the coming months. Whether you're a visitor, an extremely active Elder or Deacon, or a new member just learning about all we have to offer, this guide can help you plan your path to active and faithful church membership. Even if you think you're one of the most informed members of our congregation, the guide can be a useful reference tool for you.

I hope the *Ministries and Events Guide* will serve you as well as my old *Stylebook* serves me. Dr. Dickson would be proud. (He might also be surprised I do know the appropriate usage of comprise.)

All Are Invited

You have not truly experienced the awe-inspiring elements of our sanctuary until you have seen them through the eyes of children. During the Sunday School hour for children we utilize a rotation model where children experience a biblical story in four to five different settings (cooking, storytelling, art, etc.). In our current rotation we focus on a parable Jesus told about the great feast. For one of the sessions for this rotation I have been taking the class into the sanctuary.

We gather just in front of the communion table and I begin the lesson with them. As I am talking, I try to keep their attention (and mine) focused, which becomes increasingly difficult as one child has found a horizontal position more appealing, another keeps raising to her knees to gaze at the windows and yet another I hear counting as I turn to see him using his finger to number the pews. I keep trying to get the discussion going all the while wondering in my head – why am I losing them?

In the silence that followed one of my questions, it struck me that this was not so much about me not holding their interest, as the call of the sanctuary to be explored and appreciated proved too hard to resist. Instead of trying to call them back into the lesson I let them lead me by asking the children what they were seeing, hearing, longing to look at in this space.

Now the answers come! They bubble over with observations about the windows and who is portrayed in them, they ask questions about how the light bulbs are changed in those “really high” lights, and several are fascinated with the carving of the Last Supper on the communion table. It was a thoroughly engaging time together. Quite a few from the group have sat in a pew on Sunday mornings and been part of the worship service but rarely have they had time to take in the worship space, to just look around and see all that is there.

But alas, what of the lesson? As often happens it was I who ended up learning from the children. In a sense I saw the parable of the great feast in a new way – God invites and includes everyone. For this group of children this meant having the opportunity to come to know the place where we gather as a community to meet God and one another, a space where we seek to include young and old alike to be embraced by God. This grand space that welcomes us to observe, to wonder, to know the awesome presence of God – a place many of us gather each week without giving it a second thought. This group of children reopened my eyes and heart to the glorious beauty of our sanctuary and helped me hear God’s invitation to all of us to come and commune with the Holy One.

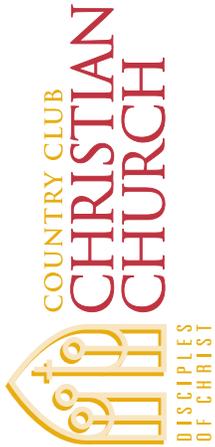
Moms’ Group – Growing in Faith
