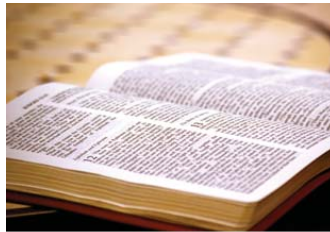

## 2014 Christmas Offering Raises More Than \$31,000

This 2014 Christmas offering raised \$31,880.57 as of Jan. 13, which was directed to Week of Compassion's efforts to win the battle against Ebola in West Africa, and to help rebuild the health care systems there.

# Forgiveness Extends into Eternity

Jesus is very clear in Mark 3: “Truly I tell you, people will be forgiven their sins.” That is an amazing statement but too often we in the church have added comments to that word of forgiveness. Too often we have said, “Well, yes, forgiveness is a gift for everyone and God will forgive every sin but...” And it is at this point that we tend to add something like “...but don’t take advantage of that forgiveness and don’t get carried away with sinning and don’t do this or that or...”

In a contemporary translation of the Bible, Jesus’ point is even clearer: “Listen to this carefully. I’m warning you. There’s nothing done or said that can’t be forgiven.” The key word in that version is “nothing.”

Jesus is clear about the universality of forgiveness but then he says, “...whoever blasphemes against the Holy Spirit can never have forgiveness, but is guilty of eternal sin.” A young Christian wrote to me a while back asking about this verse. He was very concerned about what would happen if he did this seemingly terrible thing against the Holy Spirit. I told him that I am 100% certain that if you are concerned about it, that is a sign that you don’t have to worry about this very strange and unusual statement from Jesus!

I also told him that Jesus’ point is this: the only unforgivable sin is the failure to see that God forgives every sin, every person. The only unforgivable sin is to limit God’s grace, to limit God’s desire to bring all into the light of grace.

One time, Peter quizzed Jesus on forgiveness. He asked, “How many times do we forgive, seven?” Peter most likely knew he was stretching things a bit. The rabbis taught that three times was more than enough, then let it go. By going to seven he was more than doubling the teaching.

Jesus answers, “Forgive 77 times,” or, it’s hard to tell for sure from the ancient Greek, maybe he is saying, “forgive 70 times 7 – 490 times!” Jesus isn’t worried about the math. Forgiveness isn’t something you can figure on a calculator. If you are keeping track, you haven’t yet learned how to forgive.

CS Lewis wrote, “To be a Christian is to forgive the inexcusable because God has forgiven the inexcusable in you.”

I’m pretty sure that Jesus would offer a hearty amen to Mr. Lewis’ conclusion!

On the second half of my run that day I took another route back home and saw another sign in another yard and smiled to myself again.

## Becoming An Invitational Church

There was a certain buzz in the air – and I’m pretty sure it was more than just egg casserole and good, strong coffee.

Over 50 people gathered in the Youth Center last Saturday to learn and discuss the hospitality ministry of the church. The conversation in the room demonstrated the significance of building a more intentional culture of hospitality at Country Club Christian Church.

We talk a great deal about welcome: we want this church to be welcoming; we want to welcome new faces in our midst. One of the questions we talked about on Saturday was what if beyond being welcoming, we strive to be invitational. Welcoming assumes that people will come to us – invitation presumes something different. It requires something of us. Being invitational asks that we take the first steps in extending welcome to our church, our worship, our faith formation opportunities. Being invitational means that we demonstrate a commitment to making our church home everyone’s church home.

One of the ways I hope we can begin to develop this culture is a shift in our language. It may seem like a small thing, but to think in terms of guests instead of visitors, communicates a deeper level of hospitality. We want to invite guests into our home, as opposed to merely welcoming visitors at our doorstep. Do you hear the difference? It’s a shift in vocabulary, but it is an important one!

In our conversation on Saturday, we were challenged to follow the Rule of 3 to 1: for every familiar face or friend that we talk with on a Sunday, talk to three new (or new-to-you) people. Can you imagine? How many new friends would we make in a given month? How many different Country Club Christian Church faces would a guest now know because we made the effort to seek out new people – not just the people we already know well.

At the end of the morning Saturday, I was energized. Yes, this is all hard work, and in many ways it is intimidating work, but it is good work. And as several people remarked, it is all our job – because we are to be the presence of Christ to other people, and Christ practiced invitation and hospitality, and calls us to do the same.
