The season of Lent is a 40-day period (not including Sundays) that runs from Ash Wednesday to Easter. Over the centuries, Christians of all denominations have developed specific and varied traditions during this period.

Almost uniformly, though, this season of the Church year brings the expectation of self-examination and personal growth toward the celebration of Easter. Some people give something up, while others might concentrate on some sort of learning experience. The options are as varied as the denominations.

The standard scripture readings for Ash Wednesday call us to turn away from that which separates us from the Divine and re-consecrate ourselves to a more spiritual life. For that reason, we usually culminate our worship by the imposing of ashes upon an individual's forehead or on the back of their hands. Grilled Cheese for the Journey ...

Tomato Soup for the Soul.

Last Sunday night my wife, Julie, and I hosted a dinner party for our clergy small group. We served grilled cheese sandwiches and tomato soup. Yes, we did.

When I was growing up grilled cheese and tomato soup were Sunday night standards in my house. We'd go to youth groups and the Sunday evening service and then head home for this simple little meal. I didn't really think much about it back then but when our turn to host our small group

came around, Julie and I thought it would be fun to bring this menu back to life.

Leading up to the party I posted a question on Facebook, "What is the best wine to serve with tomato soup and grilled cheese?" I could not believe the response. At last count there were over 60 replies. I've written on Facebook about serious theological, ecclesiastical and societal issues but I've never had a response like the "what wine" posting. You can go to my page and see that everything from milk to merlot was suggested. It turns out that the wine suggestions of my Facebook friends are just as diverse as their theological viewpoints.

The energetic reaction from so many caught my attention. There is something sacred about sharing a simple meal with good friends. There is something holy about breaking (or grilling) bread while sharing in laughter and conversation. I believe the Facebook recommendations were in some simple manner a way for many to reconnect with their youth (apparently tomato soup and grilled cheese is still VERY popular). But more than that, it also demonstrated the deep desire in the human community to be connected with one another.

We Christian Church folks have been gathering around the Lord's Table for a simple meal since our earliest days. Sometimes it's not much of a meal really, just a tiny chip of bread and a bland sip of Welch's. But most of the time that is more than enough to remind us that in the family of God, no matter how diverse or different we are in theology and politics, we all need a little bread for the journey and wine for the soul.

For the record, I prefer mine filled with cheese and grilled, with a side of Julie's hearty red pepper tomato soup.

Active Listening

When I was a classroom teacher, one of the first things I always taught my first graders was how to sit in active listening position. We had our first day lesson with sponges in water, showing how our brains are like muscles that can grow when we add knowledge. The second day, we would practice active listening position to show that our brains grew the most when we were sitting up straight and tall in our seats. As a naïve first year teacher, I thought, this is great! They'll be able to sit and listen and learn everything they need to know! Have you ever seen a first grader sit still for longer than a few minutes? I haven't either.

I had the opportunity to teach Pastors' Class this past Wednesday with Rev. Joe Walker. Let me tell you, we have some amazing sixth graders in our church. They are building great relationships and learning more about each other and about God each week. As Joe was teaching his lesson, everyone had something to say. We wanted to hear everything that was said, and it was hard to hear as everyone was talking at once. So, I thought a quick lesson on active listening position might help. It did, for about two minutes. On the Sunday morning following, Joe stopped by the Youth Center to say hi to his new sixth grade friends. He asked them questions about what they learned, and we were both amazed by their answers. I was really the one who learned a lesson that day. Maybe active listening position isn't all that's necessary. Maybe we can move and shake and be active, and still hear.

A couple of weekends ago at Country Club Christian Church it was all about listening. Many of you attended listening groups with the consultants from Ministry Architects. Their main job was to listen, however, I'm not convinced the consultants were the only ones who heard something. Change is hard. Change is happening. And it can be scary. It can cause us to move and shake and get overly excited or anxious. That doesn't mean we don't hear God in the process. I heard God through some of the comments in the Ministry Architects report. One parent stated, "I appreciate the freedom that our children have to explore their own faith development. I have a feeling that kids who are here a decade from now will talk about being able to ask questions in the Pastors' Class – having a greater understanding of who they are and who God is because of that." I learned from this year's Pastors' Class that to listen, you don't have to sit still and be quiet. God is here when we're anxious, upset, in the midst of change, or sitting still and quiet. God is with us in all of those moments, whether we hear the voice or not.

Children and Youth Ministry Assessment Update

On Feb. 18, Ministry Architects presented the report of the assessment performed on the children and youth ministries of Country Club Christian Church. The report details our background, challenges, and assets; puts our ministries in context based on the norms of healthy children's and youth ministries across the country; and it gives us an 18-month timeline to serve as a blueprint for the strategic launch of a sustainable, long-term Ministry to Children, Youth, and Families.

Ministry Architects spent two days listening to over 100 people in our congregation. From these listening groups, they highlighted trends that emerged. Their findings indicated that our assets include: strong intergenerational relationships, facilities, clarity of need, super staff, a welcome of diverse perspectives, mission trips, thriving preschool/PDO, and invested children, among others. Some of our challenges included: lack of unified vision, shortage of volunteers, sporadic safety and security, missing volunteer development, communication, chronic transition, and lack of curriculum plan.

While the proposed timeline outlines tasks to be completed over the next 18 months, Ministry Architects suggested that we address the following pressure points first: build a team of volunteers to ensure all bases are covered for the next two months, recruit a task force to evaluate and update the current safety policy, engage in visioning process for children's and youth ministries, evaluate our current database management process, and empower the ministry teams of both ministries.

Reverence the Day

As you may know, my stepfather, Lane, died a couple of weeks ago. He had suffered a major stroke two weeks earlier. On the Saturday morning Dad died, I called him in his hospital room in Albuquerque. Mom had just arrived for the day. Dad and I had a nice visit, horsing around as we always did on the phone. Catching up. Stupid jokes. Dad was going to visit with Mom, take a nap, and then they could eat lunch. Onehalf hour later, Mom was on the phone. Dad had died peacefully in his sleep.

I started making "the phone calls." You may

have had to make "the phone calls." One of those calls was to our son, Justin, and our daughter-in-law, Nicole. Justin said they were going to be out running errands and "would just drop by." Well played. But, the trained pastoral care minister was still able to spot the old trick of bringing the new granddaughter, Lucina, by to ease the pain by providing some distraction.

The next Thursday, we celebrated my father-in-law's 86th birthday. The whole extended family had an event planned for later in the month, but Susan and I wanted to take Pete and Nita (Dad and Mom) out to eat on his actual birthday. As it worked out, Nicole, Justin, and Lucina could join us. It was a nice opportunity to catch up and celebrate. And we had Lucina to pass around the table to be held and played with, greatly enhancing the festivities.

Lucina spent both occasions eating, smiling, gurgling, crying, filling diapers, and sleeping. That's about the extent of her repertoire at two months. On the other hand, I was struck by her presence at these two very different occasions occurring so close together.

Last day. Birthday. First days.

At just two months, Lucina can hardly be expected to grasp the significance of a day – or a lifetime of days. Perhaps it is beyond any of us – whatever our age – to truly appreciate the beauty, fragility, and unpredictability of each day or a particular chain of days. But it is not, I propose, beyond us to reverence every day and its potential as a gift from God. And by filling our days with gratitude and awe we can encourage our little ones to discover the wonder and mystery in each and all of their days as they grow.
