## Special Easter Offering for Healing and Hope

"Healing and Hope" is the theme for the 2013 Easter offering. The Outreach Council has selected two projects to share in the offering.

The first project is Sheffield Place, a local agency that provides shelter and transitional counseling services to homeless women with children in the Kansas City area. These women and their children are fed and housed at Sheffield Place for up to 24 months, and during that time they receive medical care and counseling that prepares them to transition into jobs and permanent housing, and to heal from the traumas that have led to their homelessness.

The second project is the Samaritan Care Centre in South Africa. The Samaritan Care Centre cares for those who are infected and affected with HIV/AIDS, and also is bridging cultural barriers between the colored, black and white communities. HIV/AIDS has no face, no color and no culture and, therefore, everyone is needed to help find a way forward, a cure, and ways to help one another. The volunteers and those that are cared for are black, colored, and white. This indeed is a ministry of healing and also of reconciliation.

These two projects will each receive half of this year's Easter Offering.



# Good Friday Is Too Painful

Today is Good Friday. At noon today about 150 folks will gather in our sanctuary to face the ugliness of the execution of God’s beloved child. When we hear the story of the crucifixion our beautiful gold cross will be shrouded in black cloth. The service will end in a pain-filled silence.

Most of us, me included, want to skip right over all of the unpleasant scenes of death and dying while getting ready for the trumpets of Easter. We would just as soon avoid all of the pain and the problems that are so evident and get right on

to the party. I mean, really, who wants to face a dying Jesus?

Before you try to answer that question, I must let you in on a theological truth that too many treat like a secret: A Jesus who never dies, an antiseptic Jesus who never experiences pain, will never bring us to the deep joy that God intends for every one of God’s children.

Have you seen Mel Gibson’s film, *The Passion of the Christ*? When I went to see it I took my Moleskin notebook to make notes about it. I found many theological and artistic flaws in the movie.

My wife, Julie, watched it a few weeks later. I was curious about her view of the film. Julie is one of the brightest theologians I have ever met. Her sense of the Bible and some of the deeper issues around faith are amazing. Her eyes filled with tears as she described her reaction. She said, “What would it have been like to be Mary, to see your son, your boy, beaten, whipped, tortured and killed?”

Do you see what she did that I was unwilling until that moment to do? I wanted to keep it all in my head and my mind. I wanted to write a term paper, but she followed Jesus. She stood with Mary at the foot of the cross. She went with the women to the tomb. She was willing to face the pain, the blood, the sweat, the tears.

In that moment it dawned on me that only a broken Christ can heal a broken world. When we get lost in the abstract discussion of who Christ really was or what he really might have said, we lose sight of our faith.

Life is broken. You may be too young to know that but someday every one of us will know that life breaks all of us. In God’s world, though, the breaking is the new beginning. As Ernest Hemingway’s immortal words remind us, “We are strong in the broken places.”

May your journey to the empty tomb begin at the cross,

## A Church Called Faith

Maria Guadalupe wandered onto the farm where our Nicaragua youth mission team was staying. We had worked at this adorable girls' primary school earlier in the day. She came and handed our guide a note. It said that her mother was sick and needed medicine and asked if we had any to share with her. Another group leader went through the supplies and tried to get as much as we could to share with this family who had a need. We felt weird about giving medicine to a 5-year-old so a few of us accompanied Maria to her home, which was about a five-minute walk away. When we arrived, her father greeted us warmly and thanked us for the medicine. He then very proudly invited us to come and see the church that they were building just down the road.

We walked with him as he shared how the community had been working to raise money to finish the church. We came to a simple building with a concrete floor and a tin roof. It was a large open space. He took us further into the church where there was a floor, some pillars, but no roof or walls. This was the part that they were waiting to finish. He explained that they were a church named Faith because the women of the church had prayed over each brick used to build the pillars and they had faith that soon they would have the money to finish. He explained that even though the church wasn't finished they filled it with music and praise whenever they gathered for worship. The pride in his face and voice and the way he showed us the humble building was overwhelming.

I thought about our own capital campaign. Our beautiful building on the corner of 61st and Ward Parkway is a lot like the building that isn't quite finished on the un-named street in Matagalpa, Nicaragua. We, too, are a community of faith, a community of strong people working hard to gather the money needed for our project. We, too, are proud of our space and like to share it with others, and we, too, fill our sanctuary with music and praise even though the work is not finished.

The need of sacred space crosses boundaries of language and culture. My friends in Nicaragua have taught me that we are not alone in our work to continue to offer sacred space to others. It may be a long haul and a difficult goal, but we simply must have faith in ourselves and in our God.

## Easter People

Cleaning is a loved and hated adventure in my house. I relish the feeling of all being refreshed and renewed. This year I am trying to be realistic and set aside chunks of time focused on specific projects. Needless to say, many are in limbo until we hit a little more spring like weather, but indoor projects are being tackled with umph.

Recently I was working on the bookshelf area where many of our family photo albums are housed. I began flipping through some of the ones when the boys were much younger. Easter egg hunts with friends; our cousins visiting for Easter; grandparents holding little ones in front of the church. So many special memories as I look back. I long to linger in those moments before I move on.

I wonder if I approach the mystery of Easter too much in that way – looking back on the act that revealed the transformative power of God’s new life in the world. Lingering in the awe-filled moments before I move on, back to daily life. It is so easy to be overwhelmed by what God did in the resurrection that we move past it – because how can we possibly make sense of this in our daily lives. How can we begin to live faithfully given the depth of love God reveals to human kind in Good Friday and Easter?

Words from Biblical scholar Walter Brueggemann call us to live into Easter, saying:

*It’s important, nonetheless, that we do not hold that moment back there, because Easter is always again an immediately contemporary reality. God’s power for life is always again being given in a world tempted to settle for deathliness. It is the power of death that leads to hostility toward neighbor, that evokes greed and rage and violence toward others. The Easter Lord, invites an Easter people to be about that defiant civil disobedience of new life in a weary, spent world.*

This world needs us to be an Easter people in our daily lives – to live in the moment of God’s love in all that we do. May we live showing Christ is risen!
