More than 100 children gathered Easter eggs on the Chapel lawn on Sun., Apr. 6.




Town Hall Meeting: Sharing Our Memories and Imagining Our Future

passages from the senior minister



Wholly Weak

This weekend we begin a journey, one that will take us to a parade, an upper room, a cross and finally an empty tomb. It is a strange and wonderful time. I've been through it at least 55 times in my life, yet I am always surprised by the overwhelming ugliness and pain that comes before we get to the shockingly good news of the resurrection. By the end of the seven days I'm left stunned by it all.

I recall the presentation of a sorrowful solo on Good Friday that left all of us who heard it emotionally worn out. I suspect every person in the sanctuary had tears in their eyes. My good friend

and colleague, Richard Wing, likes to refer to this time as "Wholly Weak."

Our tears are often a shorthand way of revealing the truth of what we are really experiencing. They are like messengers from the soul. The author of the Gospel of John knows this is true. He is the one who wrote the shortest verse in the Bible, "Jesus wept." When Jesus cried those tears he was standing near the tomb where Lazarus had been laid. Why is he crying? Jesus is because he knows that he must call Lazarus out so that he may enter in. Jesus weeps because he sees his own impending death.

Barbara Brown Taylor, preaching on this proclaims, "The next death we will hear about is Jesus' own, which will be scarier and stink far worse than Lazarus's did, and I believe we are given this story as a kind of dress rehearsal...It is the truth we are given to trust. 'I am the resurrection and the life,' he says. Not later but right now."

We are wholly weak before this promise but we can live with it now. It is not something we wait for at the end of all that is but a promise come true right now because we see in Jesus' tears a reflection of our death and the promise that it is not the end.

As Richard Wing says, "The worst thing to happen to you is never the last thing."

Special Easter Offering to Help Refugees

Helping refugees abroad and locally is the theme for the 2014 Easter offering. The Outreach Council has selected two projects to share in the offering.

The first project is Week of Compassion, the relief, refugee and development mission fund of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in the United States and Canada. Week of Compassion is providing relief to the estimated 8 million people displaced by the Syrian Civil War. Many have fled to neighboring Jordan, Lebanon and Turkey. Meanwhile in Syria itself millions of people lack access to water, medical care, food, shelter and other basic humanitarian needs. Week of Compassion continues to provide support to the ACT (Action by Churches Together) alliance as well as grants through Global Ministries to local partners in the region.

The second project selected is the work of Jewish Vocational Services and Cultivate KC in their efforts to help refugees. Cultivate KC and Catholic Charities have a program called New Roots for refugees. This program works with refugees who have settled in the Kansas City area. Jewish Vocational Services offers a number of programs to help refugees including Refugee Resettlement Services, Refugee Employment Services, a Refugee Relationship Enhancement program and an Immigration Counseling program.

These two projects will each receive half of this year's Easter Offering.

2014 Pastors' Class Prepares for Baptism

Twelve youth at Country Club Christian Church have taken part in the 2014 Pastors' Class, led by Rev. Monica Lewis, Minister to Children, Youth and Families. With Rev. Lewis and Faith Mentors acting as guides, each of these individuals has attended classes centering around the Bible, history of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), and the history and heritage of the Christian faith. On Palm Sunday, Apr. 13, these individuals will make formal statements of their faith and will be baptized during the 11:00 a.m. service.

God's Word on Our Hearts

Some of you gave up cookies for these 40 days. Others added daily scripture reading or guided meditation to your morning routine. The 6th graders in Pastors' Class have learned the basics of our faith in preparation for baptism. My husband gave up snapping harshly at our barky dog! Some of us don't really mark the 40 days of Lent with a special practice but we renew our commitment to listen for God's word through weekly worship or attending a Bible study. We vow to pay attention to God's presence all around us.

Now that Lent draws to a close, you may wonder if the attempts we make at connecting with God make a difference. Are we changed by prayer, worship, study, the spiritual disciplines? Sometimes we face dry periods in our spiritual journey and it seems difficult to tell if anything is fermenting. Other times we find new energy and feel transformed by the Spirit. What leads us to follow Jesus more faithfully?

There's a lovely Hasidic story of a rabbi who always told his people that if they studied the Torah, it would put Scripture on their hearts. One of them asked "Why ON our hearts, and not IN them? The rabbi answered, "Only God can put Scripture inside. But reading sacred text can put it on your hearts, and then when your hearts break, the holy words will fall inside."

I suspect that all of us recall such a moment, when our hearts were broken and the Holy One drew near. As we come to Holy Week, we recall that this is the week when even the heart of Jesus was broken open, and God's word fell inside. When Jesus is on the cross, he cries out, "My God my God why have you forsaken me?" These words from Psalm 22 fall into him. The darkest place on earth was not dark enough to keep God's love out.
