Disease, divorce, downsizing, death. Life is filled with difficult storms. When the doctor says, "cancer" or the boss says, "you've been let go," it's easy to feel overwhelmed, to feel like you are absolutely out of control and on your own with nowhere else to go.

The writers of the book of Psalms know this feeling too. Sometimes their emotions were raw and cut to the bone. One wrote, "I sink in deep mire, where there is no foothold; I have come into deep waters, and the flood sweeps over me." He is overwhelmed by insults and taunts. His life is a mess. In the end though he turns to God. He finds that even in the storm, in the mire and the mud, God is there.

In this series we'll look at some of life's most difficult storms and listen carefully for the comforting voice of God in the midst of it all.

As we celebrate together the great ministry that we share, we will pause to honor our outgoing chairpersons of the Elders and Congregational Board and welcome our incoming Chair of the Congregational Board and Chair of Elders.



2012-2013 Congregational Board Report

As the 2012-2013 church year concludes on June 30, here is a recap of the work the Congregational Board undertook in the last 12 months.

- The Board held its first retreat in many years, setting the tone and direction for the coming year.
- A new Strategic Plan for the church was introduced. During the 2012-2013 year, the church councils have been using the plan as a guidepost for moving forward as a single body.
- A special meeting of the board was held in mid-August, 2012, to review and approve a resolution to move forward with the restoration of the organ. The organ restoration is on schedule for late fall 2013.
- Upon receiving word that the exterior construction costs would be almost doubled, the Board:
 - Held a Town Hall meeting in September, presented by our structural engineer, Tom Rewerts, focused on the explanation of these increased costs.
 - Implemented a plan for phase two of the capital campaign, and through the extraordinary generosity of the congregation, raised an additional \$1.2 million in just over six weeks. Construction is on schedule for completion by late fall.
 - Held a second Town Hall meeting in November focused on the strategy to fund the increase in construction costs.
 - Approved the recommendation of the Finance Committee to secure a line of credit from Metcalf Bank. These funds have been untouched to date.
- The Board finalized the new financial structure and reporting system to identify and understand more clearly revenue and distribution of funds. All church audits are now up to date.
- Endowment Trustees finalized two years of review and an improved organization and reporting of trusts, income and expenditures.

- The Board heard an in-depth report from Lee Brumitt regarding the church's options regarding parking lots. After discussion, the board voted not to pursue usage of the lots owned by the church and Endowment for additional parking.
- Hired new Business Administrator John Clemmer.
- A strategic plan was developed that will move us closer to partnership and integration within the Northeast area of Kansas City.

The following projects are underway and ongoing.

- Study of future of the homes owned by the church and Endowment.
- Formulation of Long Term Financial Plan.
- Study of renaming Country Club Christian Church.
- Governance and Council Reorganization of the church.
- Tweaking of the Strategic Plan.
- Search committee underway for Family and Children's Ministry.

The new church year begins on July 1, 2013. The Congregational Board will be led by chair Jared Rose. Many thanks to Barbara George, outgoing board chair, and all of the individuals who have served this year.

What We Talk About When We Talk About God, by Rob Bell. I read this powerful little book during a plane flight on my way back to Kansas City from a retreat in Arizona. Bell's easy writing style invites the reader into some deep and serious thinking about God. He is easily the most influential Christian writer in the United States today.

The Social Animal: The Hidden Sources of Love, Character and Achievement, by David Brooks. This New York Times columnist is one of my favorite writers. I don't always agree with him but he always makes me think. Many folks in our church have mentioned to me how much they have enjoyed this book. I'm looking forward to reading it soon.

Our outstanding Director of Church Growth, Lauren Weinhold, told me about the book, Tipping Sacred Cows: Kick the Bad Work Habits that Masquerade as Virtues, by Jake Breeden. Way back in high school I had to read Moby Dick, by Herman Melville. I did not enjoy it. I'm pretty sure I got a lousy grade on the book report. I decided to reread it this summer for fun. Wow. What a great book! I'm only about half way through but I am thoroughly enjoying this brilliant novel.

Through Monet's Eyes

One of my favorite poems is *Monet Refuses the Operation*, by Lisel Mueller. Written as a fictional note from the famed French impressionist, Claude Monet, to the doctor who wants to restore his vision, the poem describes what happens when one views things from a perspective outside of that which is considered traditional.

Doctor, you say there are no haloes around the streetlights in Paris and what I see is an aberration

caused by old age, an affliction. I tell you it has taken me all my life to arrive at the vision of gas lamps as angels, to soften and blur and finally banish the edges you regret I don't see, to learn that the line I called the horizon does not exist and sky and water, so long apart, are the same state of being...

I like this poem because it suggests that Monet's brilliance was the result of something most of us would consider a handicap, poor eyesight. The poem implies that the soft lines and dreamy qualities which characterize Monet's most famous works are not because of his artistic genius or unique talent, but are merely the result of forgotten eyeglasses.

Sometimes I find myself needing to look at things without glasses (or contact lenses, in my case). We get used to doing things a certain way: driving the same route to work, eating the same thing for breakfast, ordering the same dish at our favorite restaurant. As human beings, we tend to think we thrive on routine, the familiar.

But, as the poem suggests, perhaps creativity is born through a change in perspective. If we always do things a certain way, just because that's the way we've always done them, are we closing the door on the water lilies?

It's easy for churches to fall victim to the hazards of familiarity, and that can make it hard for us to see things with new eyes. But the most successful churches today are open to change, have flexibility and mobility, and are willing to take off their proverbial glasses and blur the lines of the traditional.

I challenge us all to consider a new perspective on church. I challenge us to look and listen in a new way... to love and serve and give from a perspective we haven't before considered. Perhaps we should take off our glasses and examine the world, and our church's place in it, with a different, yet more creative, vision.

Letting Go

He washed his own laundry, packed his own trunk, and then got behind the wheel and headed out for the six-hour drive to summer camp. I stood by, looking both stunned and pleased at his maturity. Now that he is 17 and ready to enter his senior year of high school, my son Connor challenges me to continue growing myself.

As I was pondering this parental tension, I picked up a book by James Howell called *Struck from Behind* ... *Memories of God.* Howell cites this poem by Cecil

Day-Lewis, the Irish poet laureate who is also father of the famous movie actor Daniel Day-Lewis. The poem captured my challenge.

It is eighteen years ago ... I watched you play then, like a satellite Wrenched from its orbit, go drifting away. That hesitant figure, eddying away Like a winged seed loosened from its parent stem ... I have had worse partings, but none that so Gnaws at my mind still. Perhaps it is roughly Saying what God alone could perfectly show— How selfhood begins with a walking away, And love proved in the letting go.

It was the first time that I realized that letting the little boy I once rode bikes with on Saturdays drive himself to camp was more than a parenting experience but also a holy mystery related to God. This process of letting go might apply to many avenues of our lives – mentoring an employee, tutoring a student, helping a friend or family member, serving an organization. Jean Vanier, a Canadian philosopher and founder of a home for developmentally disabled young men, defined love like this:

To love someone is not to do things *for* them, but to reveal to them their beauty and value, to say "You are beautiful. You are important. I trust you. You can trust yourself." We all know well that we can do things for others and in the process crush them, making them feel that they are incapable of doing things by themselves. To love someone is to reveal to them the light that is shining in them." (From *Brokeness to Community*).

Fountains of Faith Sunday School The Gospel According to Dr. Seuss June 2013


