Ongoing Bible Study

For persons interested in a long-term Bible study, the following options will continue through the year.

Faithbook – Women ages 25-66 explore the scriptures and share in friendship and the spirit does the rest! If you don't have time for homework between your work, your family and your volunteering, then this is the class for you. Led by Rev. Carla Aday. The group meets Tuesday evening OR Wednesday morning. Pick the time frame that fits for your schedule. Tuesdays, 7:00-8:00 p.m., Sept. 10-Nov. 19, Jan. 7-Apr. 22 Wednesdays, 9:00-10:00 a.m., Sept. 11-Nov. 20, Jan. 8-Apr. 2.

Disciple Bible Study I Option *I* – The goal is not to learn about the Bible, although you will learn all about it from Genesis to Revelation. More importantly you will grow in your journey as a Disciple. Participants commit to weekly attendance and homework. Materials cost \$35. Led by Rev. Carla Aday and Lesley Holt. Thursdays, 9:00-11:00 a.m. Sept. 5-May 29. *Option 2* – for those who don't want to make the commitment of every week or don't have time for the homework. This class meets every other week instead of every week for two years to cover the entire Bible. Led by Randy Irey and Greg Lear. Every other Monday, Oct. 7-May 6, 7:00-9:00 p.m.

Christian Believer – Open to all who have completed Disciple Bible Study I, this 30-week class meeting over two years explores the basic ideas of Christian theology. Participants will read primary sources from history, discuss scriptural themes and watch a short video from a leading modern theologian. Led by Rev. Chuck Murphy. First and third Wednesdays of the month, beginning Sept. 4, 6:30-8:00 p.m.

Senior Adult Bible Study – Designed for senior adults. Meets every Wednesday morning to study the Bible in an effort to create a deeper understanding through lecture and discussion. This year's subject is the Gospel of Mark. Led by Rev. Chuck Murphy. Begins Sept. 4 at 9:00 a.m., Rm. 206.

Amazing Grace, How Sweet the Sound

When we proclaim a word of grace to a world dying for love, dying for hope, dying to be received for who they are, we are following in the footsteps of Jesus.

When we allow grace to become the driving force in our congregation, we are becoming more like the church that God calls us to be.

When grace is at work in our homes, our offices, our schools and our playgrounds, we are living out the very gospel.

Grace is amazing but it is not an easy thing to understand. I was teaching a Bible study on Romans many years ago in another church. We came to chapter 8 and that marvelous section that reminds us "that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor height, nor depth, NOR ANYTHING else in all creation will be able to separate us from the love of God."

I suggested to the class that the implication here was quite clear: God will do everything possible to bring us under the loving care of heaven. God will never run out of patience with us. God, in this life or in the next, will do everything possible to bring all of us to the place named home, to the place where we finally will be loved.

A man in the class asked to speak to me afterward. "I've lived my whole life doing the right thing, practicing morality, making the right choices. Now you're telling me it didn't matter, that God loves everybody anyway. Why should I bother with living a good life when grace is there?" The central issue? He didn't think he needed grace.

I understand what he is getting at but look at Jesus in the gospel stories. He is kind and compassionate to the lost, the least, the little, the sinners, the ones who knew that they needed grace. He saved his harshest words for the super religious ones who thought they didn't need grace.

In the book, *If Grace is True*, the authors write, "God has loved us from the very beginning...God did not wait to see if we were lovable. God did not require us to earn God's love. God did not reserve his love for some and deny it to others. God has loved all of us from the very beginning." Amazing and true.

Back to Church

My niece's chin quivered. Her expressive blue eyes welled with tears and her brow furrowed. She gulped back a sob as she whispered, "But I won't know anyone. None of my friends will be there."

No amount of reassurance, by way of hugs, encouragement, or promise of special treats, comforted her. She was convinced that the next day was going to be the absolute worst day of her 6-year-old life: the first day of First Grade.

Though she'd sailed effortlessly through Kindergar-

ten, charming teachers along the way, the thought of First Grade had been troubling her. Yes, the building would be familiar. Yes, she liked reading, learning and making friends. "But in First Grade you have to do HOME-WORK!" she cried. "I don't even know how to do homework!" A new teacher and a classroom without any familiar friends can sound so ominous to a sensitive child. "I'm feeling so nervous," she wept, the abundance of confidence she usually displays evaporated.

The first day came, and I was anxious and nervous for her, worried she'd be pink-faced and crying as her parents dropped her off; worried she'd be feeling sad and alone all day. Finally, word came from her parents: Once she stepped into that familiar school, it all came back to her. She flitted about hugging teachers missed over the summer. She admired her new classroom with her name on her desk. When I saw her after school, the twinkle had returned to her eyes as she told me, animatedly, that she'd had a "*Fantastic! Day!*"

As children go back to school across the metro area, those of us with children in our lives are preparing to settle back into a familiar routine. For many, that routine includes a return to church after a summer spent away. And for some of us coming back to church after a lengthy time away might feel a little scary, like the first day of First Grade. Will we feel welcomed at the front door? Will worship feel unfamiliar? Will anyone remember our names?

This Sunday, Aug. 18, is Festival Sunday, a great day to come back to church. Whether you've been away for the summer, or for many years; whether you've been away from Country Club Christian Church or away from church in general, maybe this is a good Sunday to come back. An Unforgettable Moment

I hang out in prisons. It's a "God thing." I'm not sure why God decided to send me into prisons, it just happened. And I could no more have ignored that call than I could have turned my back on God. I've come to see it as a way to give back, as a way to bring compassion and healing into a place where brokenness is the norm. The men and women in prison are among the most forsaken people in the world. I've been into prisons now for more than 20 years, and I'm still amazed at some of the things I hear and learn--especially about lost childhoods. Yet these individuals rarely understand the loss; it's a norm for

them. They simply endure it, unaware of how much it mangles their souls.

I've learned a great deal in prison: how much a touch on the arm or a handshake can mean to someone who never feels the warmth of a kind touch. It's seems small and insignificant, but to them, it's caring and comfort. It's love.

I've seen tough, initially shy and awkward men learn to laugh—at me, but mostly "with me." They think it's great fun to steal my favorite positive thoughts: "Be the change you want to see in the world" or "Change is inevitable; growth is optional." We begin a meeting with each person sharing a positive thought and they come up with ways to foil me. One might use my quote; another might say: "Your quotes have been banned." It might seem silly, but silliness isn't something that happens in prison. In many ways, it's relief, relief from the nastiness they encounter on a routine basis. It may well be the only time all week when they can laugh at someone and not be ridiculed for it. And I'm glad they've become comfortable enough to do it with me.

Lots of people think I'm nuts to go into prison. Maybe I am. But I've seen incredible transformations happen—not because we talk about God or anything religious, but because this has become a place where they can share their feelings and even sometimes bare their souls. This is a place where someone will listen and not condemn; it's a place where they're respected as human beings, regardless of their brokenness. Prison can be a "God place."
