Church Branding Project Seeks Your Input

Last year, the Congregational Board initiated a project to study the mission, vision and identity of Country Club Christian Church, laying out a six-phase process to discern what message we want to give the community about who we are as a church, and how our message and identity can honor our past, reflect our theology and serve our neighbor. Now, the project moves into the creative refinement phase, and your input is needed.

For the next month we will be gathering your comments and ideas. You can participate by filling out a Branding Project worksheet, available in the Parlor or online at cccckc.org.

The worksheet reviews key messages about what makes our church distinctive, reviews who we are as a church and who we want to reach, and what we want our church brand to reflect to the community. These messages were gathered from input at the Apr. 27 Town Hall meeting.

You are asked to provide suggestions for new ways to use our current name through a slogan or a "nickname" OR suggestions for a new church name.

To date, a committee has developed objectives for this project and conducted initial research and input was gathered from the congregation at the Town Hall meeting. From that input, the committee developed key messages and criteria

passages from the senior minister

Telling the Truth to God by Dr. R. Glen Miles



Telling the truth to God is not as easy it might sound, especially when it comes to prayer. I've given and heard many prayers over the years; at the Communion Table, in hospital rooms, at meals, in Sunday school classes, at weddings and funerals, even at football games. Many times the content of these prayers is focused on what the person thinks God wants to hear. At other times they are mini-sermons with a particular audience in mind.

I recall coming home early several years ago in order to deal with one of my boys who had spent

the afternoon in the principal's office. Julie knew I was coming early so she wisely had dinner ready when I walked in the door. I wanted to launch into a lecture on proper behavior but first we sat at the table and prayed. One of the boys, the one in deep trouble at school, volunteered to pray. He said,

"Thank you, God for loving us and forgiving us NO MATTER WHAT!"

Our laughter was our amen. That little prayer helped us, especially me, relax and face the issue of the day (which as it turned out wasn't that big of a deal).

That is what an open and honest prayer life can do: set us free from worry and anxiety while facing whatever hard truth night be in front of us. That honesty defines the difficulty of the task of prayer. I know about a variety of prayer techniques, forms and styles. I've led workshops on how to pray in theologically and ecclesiastically correct language but if I am not willing to pray with openness and honesty then the form, the language and the style are almost irrelevant.

David Jacobsen writes in his book, *Clarity in Prayer*, "If you are talking with someone who already knows the truth, you had best stay close to the facts."

He's right. If prayer is going to have any effect on your life it is a pretty dang good idea to go ahead and be honest about who you are before God. In the long run, that honesty will lead to a refreshed and renewed life of faith.

Landscaping About to Begin

One of the orange construction fences from the front lawn is gone! I am happy to report that the work by C&M Restoration is virtually complete as I write this and the second orange fence and the cranes should be gone by this Saturday (the 16th).

The final areas of work by C&M were in the area of the front door and octagon turret to the left. The building looks stunning as the final phases of their work are being completed. I invite you to take a look

at the front of the church if you haven't lately. The building looks spectacular.

The next phase of the project will include new sidewalks, lighting, irrigation, and landscaping. Some highlights of this phase will include:

- New lighting and additional landscaping at the front is designed to create a more welcoming environment.
- New exterior lighting will highlight architectural features of the church. In addition there will be new bollards to improve lighting. The new LED lights will be energy efficient. Eighteen watt spotlights will light the top of the bell tower.
- New sidewalks will include an expanded area at the front door which will include decorative brick. This enlarged entrance area will be completely surrounded by landscaping including perennials and annuals to add beauty and color. This should be a beautiful place for wedding photos!
- The shrubs in front of the building will be replaced and redbud trees added.
- The front lawn and back lot will have new turf.
- The chapel landscaping was recently updated by volunteers with the Green Team and Grace at Work.

It is very exciting to see the building repairs completed and the final parts of the project about to start. As always we thank everyone for their generous donation of time and energy to make this project possible.
