Tax Cut and Jobs Act Implications

The recently passed Tax Cut and Jobs Act has provisions which will cause many taxpayers to lose the benefit of itemized deductions, including charitable deductions. While the bill keeps the charitable deduction, it will not be beneficial for most taxpayers to itemize deductions as the result of a larger standard deduction of \$12,000 for single individuals and \$24,000 for married couples. While it is normally advantageous to make charitable contributions in December which would usually be made early in the following year, this year there is added reason to do so because for many individuals the deduction will be lost next year. Please consult your tax professional for the most up to date information.

Please remember now is a great time to bring your annual pledge up to date. All gifts to be credited for the 2017 tax year must be in the church office by noon Sun. Dec. 30 or postmarked by Dec. 31 if mailing to the church. \mathbb{T}

Pondering What Falls from the Sky

espite not yet having finished the book, I feel the need to tell you about it. What Falls from the Sky is Esther Emery's memoir, and with a subtitle that tells you most of what you need to know: How I Disconnected from the Internet and Reconnected with the God Who Made the Clouds.

It's probably halfway through the book before she identifies the two most repeated responses she got while conducting this year-long experiment. She

claims that those born before 1979 used words like "interesting" and wanted to hear what she was learning from it; the younger persons, however, did not find it interesting at all, but wondered about the "implications." They wanted to know why she would do such a thing in the first place, and how it was even possible.

But as the subtitle indicates, Emery didn't just go off the grid but experienced more of life and found God in the process. She claims that she and her husband communicated more deeply, had more sex, cooked more real meals, and read almost the entire Bible. As for the part about finding God, it wasn't just time with the Bible but her venturing into a church for the first time in her life and realizing there had been a hole there that all the apps and smart phones in the world could never fill.

Let's face it, the use of technology in our day and age is complicated. True, persons can lose touch with their loved ones and friends with too much screen time; but you can also Google where the best spiritual retreats can be found near you. I think I found Emery's book so meaningful because in addition to her premise and the lyrical writing, it's the kind of advice I've been giving students for 59 semesters now. (I started teaching as a child, in case you're wondering.) I have told aspiring preachers that there are some really great resources on the web and how they'd be crazy not to use those. But I have also said that good sermons need time to develop the way babies in the womb need gestation. And as far as I'm concerned, being still and pondering God's ways in the world is sometimes best done unplugged. Preacher or not, that seems like wise counsel at this busy time of year. If you're interested in the book, I'm guessing you know how to look it up. \bigset{\mathbb{T}}

f you were in the 11:00 a.m. worship service on Sun., Dec. 10, you had the distinct pleasure of hearing the Country Club Singers' anthem, *Calypso Carol*, featuring Dr. Paul Tucker both at piano and as the soloist.

Calypso Carol has a Caribbean flair

that had the congregation not only clapping in time with the beat, but also prompted a spontaneous standing and swaying by the majority of the folks in the room. Now in some churches that kind of thing happens every Sunday, but let's just say for us it was a little unusual and completely delightful.

It was one of those moments in worship where I thought to myself, "I wish I could share this with everyone I know." Carla followed up with a particularly stirring sermon, and halfway through I texted a friend and said, "You're gonna want to listen to this one."

I love these magical worship moments, and that is why I'm so excited that they are now available to a wider audience every Sunday through our live streaming service, and on demand any time.

Now I'm not giving you permission to skip worship, because nothing compares to actually being in the room. But, if you're out of town or otherwise unable to get out on a particular Sunday, go to www.cccckc.org at 11:00 a.m. and click the big red button that says "Click to View LiveStream," scroll down a little and you'll see the embedded streaming module. When you click the play button, if a service is underway you'll see it live, or you'll be given the option to view a previous Sunday's broadcast.

We've already had folks tune in who travel during the winter and others who were visiting relatives and shared the live stream with them. The live stream or archive is a great way for our homebound members to stay connected to the church. And it's a great way for you to share those magical moments with your friends and family too.

For example, you can tell them how to access the archived stream from Sun., Dec. 10 and fast forward to the 20:45 mark to hear *Calypso Carol* for themselves, followed by Carla's sermon. I'm pretty sure that when they do, they're going to want to tune in again and again, and hopefully someday visit in person too.
