Jesus Sought Me When a Stranger Dr. R. Glen Miles



Last Sunday as the KU Chamber Singers combined with our own Chancel Choir filled the rafters of our sanctuary with the overwhelmingly beautiful sound of the final anthem for the day, "Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing," my vision was momentarily blocked by the tears pooling in my eyes. I could barely see but it did not matter. Their song was the perfect end to a wonderful day of worship and praise.

As their strong voices carried the message forward I was caught by the serene simplicity of the opening line in the third verse: "Jesus sought me when a

stranger." In that moment my mind rushed to all of the many ways Jesus has worked though our church to welcome the stranger. This congregation has done amazing things lately. We've welcomed many who otherwise might have been ignored, forgotten or pushed aside by our culture. My eyes were filled with tears of gratitude for the way this church continues to live out the command of Jesus to welcome all.

I thought too of my life and Jesus' willingness to come after me even when I chose to wander away from God's care. I recalled my mom, who will be here this weekend to celebrate Mother's Day, and the way she has loved me throughout her life even when I was at my worst and less than lovable. I also realized in that moment that my sons have always loved me even when I was a lousy father. And, I pretty much lost it during the anthem when I considered how grateful I am for the love of my life and the gracious joy Julie has brought to all that we have shared together as husband and wife.

I love this old gospel hymn for the way it both calls us to account for the foibles and missteps in our lives and the way it names God's merciful willingness to come after us. That is a pretty good summary of the good news of Jesus Christ. We are loved. When we are lost, even when we choose on our own to go in the wrong direction, God comes after us, to rescue us from danger.

Sunday's service was a sweet reminder of the power of God's Spirit among us and what can happen when we open our hearts and minds to God. I am so very proud of this church and our willingness to love God, each other and our neighbor (no matter who they are). The road that God sets before us is not always easy to walk. We, like the old song says, are "prone to wander." Nevertheless, God still believes in us and is always willing to find us and fill our hearts with love again and again.

Even now as I type these words my eyes are filled with tears of gratitude for the God who never stops looking for you and me.

Making a Movie By Lara Schopp, Director of Communications



At the beginning of her career, my mom was a high school teacher in the small town where I grew up. While she doesn't remember that stage of her professional life fondly, a few of her students made an impression on her.

Early in my own career, Mom put me in touch with one of those former students who lived here, and he and I made plans to meet for lunch. Rick is a filmmaker, and my mom thought he'd be a good contact for me professionally. I'm not sure what

I expected, but I don't think it was the long-haired, gravely voiced, leatherwearing, motorcycle-riding man I met that day. I was intimidated by his crazy look, but soon we were laughing as he told me tales of his work.

Rick has worked on critically acclaimed independent films, as well as dozens of national television ads for big brands. He's active and well-respected in Kansas City's film community, and I learned a little lesson that day about judging a book by its cover.

Since I took Electronic Media 101 in college, shooting and editing video with ancient equipment, I've been interested in filmmaking, though my career did not take me down that path. Until recently.

I hope you've had the opportunity to see our newest video, "How Can I Keep from Singing?" about this year's Stewardship Campaign. The concept for the video is about extraordinary moments in life that make us want to sing with joy.

I started by having the campaign theme song arranged into an instrumental track, then I interviewed Lesley Holt, Hannah Fenley, Steve Bough and Avery Davenport, Elvin Knight and his grandchildren, Lucy and Max Patterson, and campaign chair J.J. Jones. I eventually edited more than an hour of conversation down to just a couple of minutes of moments, and mixed in photos and video of the life of our church community over the last year.

One of our communication goals is to use video more liberally and effectively. To that end, while I'll never be as good at filmmaking as my friend Rick, I'm trying to get better. We think video gives folks a more intimate and tangible look at who we are as a church.

Our new Faith and Grief Lunch Ministry, on the first Tuesday of every month, offers a safe place for those who grieve to remember, listen, and pray together. All are welcome – those of all faiths as well as those who profess no spiritual beliefs. The lunch is free, provided by the sponsoring churches. A free will offering basket is available for those who wish to support this ministry.

You Are Not Alone

As Mother's Day approaches, my heart is with all women. All of them. The mother who is so fortunate to have the family she's always dreamed of. The mother who has struggled with her own fertility or the fertility of her partner. The woman who is happy with the children she does or doesn't have but for whom the path to that place was complicated. The mother who has given birth to a baby who was never able to take a breath. Mothers who are sitting in the NICU right now unsure of life's next turn. Mothers who are eagerly anticipating the arrival of their child.

The mother who feels guilty. The woman who is navigating motherhood while living with postpartum depression. The woman who is missing her mother. The mother who is missing her child. The mother who is on pins and needles waiting for the arrival of the child she's adopting. The aunts and grandmothers and friends raising children. The young girls I see every day for whose present and future I pray. The women who have found that being happy doesn't always mean escaping tragedy or grief.

This morning I read a blog post by my friend Brooke who is brilliant, witty, one of the smartest people I know and the mother of three girls, Eliza, Caroline and Colette. Eliza, who was stillborn, prompted Brooke's blog post discussing W. H. Auden's poem "Musee de Beaux Arts" in which he describes the painting called Landscape and the Fall of Icarus. Bruegel's painting shows the landscape of a typical seaside town with people going about their business. What is not immediately seen in it are the legs of Icarus (from Greek mythology) sticking out of the water after his fall. Here's what Brooke has to say, "Because that's the thing that Bruegel and Auden know about suffering. It happens while someone else is eating a sandwich. Or rolling down a car window. Or just walking dully along. It doesn't knock the entire world off its axis. It's barely a blip on the radar. A boy falls out of the sky, and ploughman doesn't notice and the shepherd is a few seconds too late to figure out what's going on." My prayer for you is that your experience isn't forgotten. Not everyone will know. Not everyone will care. But your church does.

Though it's as romanticized as marriage in our culture, motherhood and the quest for it is wrapped in many layers of emotions and experiences. For some it's fantastic. For others it's tragic. And for many it's both. However you experience Mother's Day, I want you to know this: you are not alone. You are God's beloved and your church will walk with you this Sunday and all the days after.
