The India Experience

Stunning, terrifying, fast-paced, loud, aesthetically tumultuous and raw. All words that could describe scenes or moments in India as witnessed by 10 church members in Country Club Christian Church's first mission trip to India.

Kind, serious, humble, loving, intelligent, generous and open. Just a few of many words to describe the wonderful people (now friends) at Christian Hospital Mungeli, in the central part of the country, who welcomed us into their home.

This once deteriorating mission hospital is now a thriving medical center with its own nursing school, the first low-cost cancer treatment center in the area, a K-12 English-language school for 1,000 kids, and soon, a new birthing center. And when they welcome teams like ours, they take a different approach to mission work – asking participants to use their skills and talents instead of assigning tasks.

We taught English, produced instructional videos about blood donation, helped review medical records, produced signage for the hospital grounds, created a hospital staff directory, preached, played beautiful music and were many times simply there for them as they were for us. For almost an entire month, Country Club Christian Church members were present in this tiny, impoverished, overlooked corner of the world. Ask any of them about the trip. They'll be glad to share their stories, their favorite moments and their tips...for your trip...next year.

The season of Lent for many is a time to give something up. Many folks will refrain from eating chocolate or meat. Others will not watch television. I've seen posts on Facebook from a few friends relating that they are taking a social media sabbatical in order to help them focus on the way of Christ during this season of introspection.

These practices are all worthwhile. I must admit, however, that my attempts in the past have come with mixed results. One year I gave up sweets for Lent. By the end of the 40 days the staff, after putting up with my crankiness due to lack of donuts and cake, said with one voice, "Have a cookie. Please!" I'm pretty sure that Jesus never said, "And yea verily the world will know you by your grumpiness."

This year I am going to focus on making affirmations. Every day I am going to affirm at least one person for something positive I see in the way they do their work, live their life or model what it means to be like Christ. Already today (as I type this column on Ash Wednesday morning) I have witnessed several great opportunities for affirmation. Just taking the time to look for the good in the world has reminded me that we are surrounded by amazing and beautiful people all of the time.

One a day won't be hard to accomplish. Once I set a goal I'm pretty good about going after it. I'll record the affirmations in my journal. No one else will see them but I like to assure myself that I am staying on track.

In the long run though, what I am really trying to do is reorient my life toward God. Lent is a time to reflect. It is an opportunity to take an account of our lives, our faith, our dreams, even, to see if they line up with God's desire for the world. This year's goal is simple – make sure at least one person per day knows that I appreciate something about them. I pray that this simple path will help me to reaffirm over and over again the very word of heaven spoken by God when humans were created, "God saw everything made...and indeed, it was very good."

An Adventure to Remember

During a visit to the preK program a few weeks ago, I mentioned that I was going to the attic. This, of course, elicited many questions: Where is the attic? What is an attic? Is it scary?

For the sake of imagination and wonder I told the children that the attic was cold and dark; it was up more stairs from their classroom and the door was small so a person had to bend down when walking through. With just a slight hesitation, two children bravely asked if they could go along to see this mysterious place.

The walk to third floor was full of excited chatter and more questions. At the attic, I opened the door and we immediately felt the cold air; without turning on the light I said, "Okay, go ahead in." All their courage disappeared and they backed away so I flipped the switch and went in followed very closely by two nervous 4-year-olds.

Nervous hesitation turned into excited exploration as they made their way through old furniture, boxes of church history and large toys stored for later. They touched, opened, lifted, and even bravely climbed more stairs to see what was stored in the space above the attic. A cobweb sparked stories about all the creatures that must surely live in the attic and an old desk chair had them wondering if people "just sit and look at all the cool stuff up here."

Caught up in listening to their conversation and answering questions, I completely forgot why I went to the attic in the first place. It was no longer a cold place full of old and unused stuff, but an adventure in history and wonder seen through the eyes of children.

Eventually we had to go back to the classroom. The children couldn't wait to tell their friends about all the things they had seen, but also about their bravery.

As we were about to walk out of the attic, one of the children saw a framed picture of the church. He said, "I need to get one of those." The other child asked why (before I could) and he said, "That's my school. I always want to remember this place because it was fun."

Pratima, age 24, was the nurse assigned to welcome me to the mission hospital in India. Pratima knew where to buy Indian fabric and spices. As we meandered through the narrow muddy streets, she held my hand and pulled me close when a motorcycle, bull or rickshaw barreled past us. Like a chivalrous date, Pratima, insisted on walking on the street side with me safely on the inside.

Each member of the mission team had someone like Pratima watching over us. We began calling these nurses our guardian angels. When we suggested a dinner outing, the young nurses giggled with excitement but they also appeared hesitant. When we sat down at the long table, we asked our new friends, who could read the Hindi menu, to order some platters we could all share. Out came steaming platters of spicy noodles, stir fry vegetables and some delicious but unidentifiable delicacies. Several times we Americans at the table said “let’s order another platter of this” but each time the nurses said “oh, this is plenty, we don’t need more.” The bill astonished me. For the 16 of us to eat dinner, it cost only \$20.

I later learned that the nurses were reluctant to dine at the restaurant because they knew it was so expensive. They refused to order more food because they feared it would cost too much. In that moment, my vision shifted. Suddenly I saw \$20 not as four cups of latte at Starbucks but as a feast for a group of angels in India. Suddenly I saw the platters of food as sacred gifts of God and I didn’t want to take too much. And then, when I looked back at the nurses who were our guardian angels, I realized that because of their humility and gracious hospitality, I had truly dined at the communion table.
