Country Club Christian Church will provide ongoing support for the first Syrian family to be resettled to the United States under a speeded up "surge operation" to resettle families fleeing that war-torn region. Volunteers from the church have been preparing a home for the family that arrived Wed., Apr. 6 from the Jordanian capital, Amman.

Syrian Refugee Family, continued from page 1

The family, who is from the Syrian city of Homs, had been living in Mafraq, a town north of Amman, for three years. Since October last year, 1,000 Syrian refugees have moved from Jordan to the U.S. The resettlement surge hopes to increase that number ten-fold. A



resettlement surge center opened in Amman in February to meet President Barack Obama's target of resettling 10,000 Syrians to the United States by Sep. 30. Every day, the center interviews some 600 Syrian refugees.

Nancy Lear was interviewed by several local media outlets about Country Club

Christian Church's work to prepare for the family's arrival and the church's planned ongoing support. "Greg and I were proud to represent our congregation in welcoming this beautiful family to our community. I look forward to continuing to help support this and other refugee families who have been and will be resettled in Kansas City. This is one small way we can honor Jesus' teaching to love our neighbors and welcome the stranger, remembering that Jesus was clear that our neighbors are not just people who look and think like us"



Jackie Cunningham, who watched the news coverage of the family's arrival on television, said, "Since I made up the beds for the family, I smiled as I looked at each member knowing they would be resting in the beds that I had touched with love and compassion."

The church will provide ongoing support for the family in partnership with Della Lamb.

In December 2015, the church's congregational board signed a statement of welcome to refugees, declaring that as people of faith and disciples of Jesus Christ, we are unequivocally called to welcome the stranger. reStart is the only shelter for homeless teens in Greater Kansas City. The Harvesters Warehouse will welcome volunteers 8 years and older with parental supervision. Volunteers will help sort food donations received from the community.

New to partner sites is Jerusalem Farm in the Historic Northeast. The farm focuses on sustainable gardening projects and light home repair so that seniors and low-income families can remain in their homes.

Holy Falling Dr. R. Glen Miles



When have you have grown the most in your faith, in your search for something holy and sacred? When have you discovered that pearly ache for something beyond your own simple desires? Was it at a time when everything was perfect and wonderful and there was nothing to worry about or did you grow the most when you were challenged at the very fiber of your soul?

I am embarrassed to admit how many times I have been humbled and brought down low by my own foolish actions or silly mistakes only to recognize that in the humbling, in the falling apart,

something new and stronger was being put in place. In these moments I find that the simplest and most basic needs, love and forgiveness, peace and well-being, are the finest gifts.

Have you been in worship when we dedicate infants? I hold the child in my arms and walk through the sanctuary with the little one and remind everyone of Jesus words: "Unless you change and become like children you will never enter the kingdom of heaven."

That is not a word about who gets into heaven and who does not. It is a word about how we can experience heaven in the here and now.

As Bono sings in one of U2's best songs: "The more you see the less you know."

Richard Rohr reminds us, in his book *Falling Upward*, "The human ego prefers anything, just about anything, to falling, or changing, or dying. The ego is that part of you that loves the status quo – even when it's not working. It attaches to past and present and fears the future."

Jesus understood this better than any others. He said, "Those who find their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it."

Here is the good news for the day: If you feel like your life is falling apart and you have no idea what to do next, maybe it is a sign that God is about to do something new and wonderful within your very life. The God of all creation is more than creative enough to turn your failure into a gracious reboot.

The loss of a loved one or friend may have been very recent and your grief may be very immediate and intense. Or you may have lost someone years ago and an anniversary or similar event has reawakened that pain.

Our new Faith and Grief Lunch Ministry offers a safe place for those who grieve to remember, listen, and pray together. Participants gather around tables for a simple box lunch and sharing guided by a trained facilitator. You may attend one time or for as long as you find the lunch helpful. The meal begins at noon and ends promptly at 1:00 p.m., making it accessible for those who work. Lunches are offered the first Tuesday of every month. The next session will be May 3. Everyone is welcome - those of all faiths as well as those who profess no spiritual beliefs. The lunch is free, provided by the sponsoring churches. A free will offering basket is available for those who wish to support this ministry.

After the Hallelujah Chorus

After the Hallelujah Chorus, then what? Oh, I know, brunch and hunting for eggs. But what about the next day? If Easter is more than a day, then surely this season invites us to make room for the Spirit of God to rise within our lives.

I've been busy reading maps. On June 1 I will begin sabbatical and the first step will be to walk 111 kilometers across Spain to Santiago, to the church where the bones of St. James are enshrined. For hundreds of years, Christians have taken this walk as a spiritual pilgrimage. You may have read about this "Camino" or

seen the movie about it called "The Way" starring Martin Sheen.

So I was startled recently when I came across this poem that begins "If you have a compass smash it" and goes on to say that you should "tear up your map." The poem reminds me that sometimes in order to "truly see" we must first get lost. The poem, by Jose Alcantara, summoned me to reflect on the spiritual journey, not just the physical journey.

Those who followed Jesus were not initially called "Christians" but those who were on "the way" (see the book of Acts). They were, like us, trying to walk in "the way" of Jesus. So as you think about your own journey, what helps you walk in the ways of compassion, courage, peace? And are there times when the compass and the map need to be discarded so that you can just listen to the voice of love and grace within your own heart?

In his own journey, Jesus often took some time away from the crowds and busyness of his life to be alone and pray. Sometimes it is just easier to accomplish what is on the to-do list for the day. But if we want to follow in Christ's ways, we may need to turn off the cell phone and tear up the list of chores and sit in the chapel, or take a walk in the park or call a friend to share lunch. Blessings on the way....
