## Lent Begins with Ash Wednesday

**March 1, 6:00 p.m. Sanctuary**

The season of Lent is a 40-day period (not including Sundays) that runs from Ash Wednesday to Easter (Apr.

16). Over the centuries, Christians of all denominations have developed specific and varied traditions during this period.

Almost uniformly, though, this season of the Church year brings the expectation of self-examination and personal growth toward the celebration of Easter. Some



people give something up, while others might concentrate on some sort of learning experience. The options are as varied as the denominations.

The standard scripture readings for Ash Wednesday call us to turn away from that which separates us from the Divine and re-consecrate ourselves to a more spiritual life. For that reason, we usually culminate our worship by the imposing of ashes upon an individual's forehead or on the back of their hands.

Join us on Ash Wednesday, Mar. 1, at 6:00 p.m. in the Sanctuary for a traditional imposition of ashes. Rev. Monica Lewis will preach.

## Hearing a Different Voice

For the uninitiated, FaithPub consists of the potent combination of three things: beer, testosterone and spiritual conversation. Lots of bars feature the first two items, with the latter often focusing on Tom Brady's latest heroics, that sort of thing. But in this case, FaithPub is a men's group ministry of our church that meets at a pub to fellowship, drink a beer (or root beer), and hear a testimony by a guest speaker.

Glen Miles invited me a long time ago, but it was after he announced his departure, that I got to come and speak. In my case, I was to tell my story and say something about my hopes for the preaching ministry at Country Club Christian Church. I thought, then, I might share here those hopes with all of you, two broad goals as it turns out.

The first is practical in nature, namely how hearing a different voice prepares a congregation for the next Senior Minister. And by "voice," I don't just mean that literally. "Voice" includes a preacher's style of sermons, use of a manuscript or not, as well as differences between sermon series and following a lectionary. In that latter case, for the next few months, I'm loosely following The Narrative Lectionary, specifically Jesus' journey to Jerusalem found in Luke's Gospel. The next Senior Minister will be different from me, just as I am different from Glen.

The second goal is more spiritual in nature. I think of the goal of preaching in general as fostering an encounter with God. When preaching works, more takes place than words being spoken and heard; people are encountered by the Holy One. In the Old Testament, the term "word" can also be translated "deed." Something happens in the preaching moment. For me, that encounter with the Divine is a mix of exposition and experience, or teaching and touching. As I see it, the best preaching provides congregants with something to reflect upon and inspires as well, usually by means of compelling stories.

There is one other element to good preaching, one often overlooked: a good congregation. The people in the pews do not constitute a passive audience, but they participate in the preaching of the gospel themselves. At the risk of appearing to be kissing up, I have to say, I have always thought of our congregation as really good listeners. And for that, all I can say is, "Thanks be to God."

ies in Estes Park, Colorado. Cost is \$1,700 for a private room; \$375 for the women's bunk room. Food and activity fee of \$85 per person.

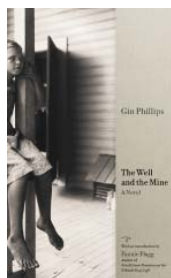
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## BUILDING COMMUNITY BOOK *by* BOOK

## So What Comes Next?

While our students (6th-12th graders) may not seem very vocal in large group settings, if you get them in their element, you can't get a word in edge wise! This is something I absolutely love about them; their personality, their independence, their voice. But until this past week, I've gotten minimal feedback on their input for the survey regarding the search for a new Senior Minister. During a Sunday School discussion last week, mid-faith lesson, one student raised a hand and asked me "what is the update on the search for

a new Senior Minister? What is to come next for our church?" Luckily, I had paid attention to the newsletter and other announcements to report to them what the Discernment Committee has stated to be the process.

I jumped at the opportunity to hopefully get group discussion going. Many of the students discussed that they are worried that Dr. Miles has been their Senior Minister their entire life and that they will not have the same connection. They discussed that their hopes for the new Senior Minister would be "someone that just comes and hangs out with us (the students)," "someone that knows my name," "someone who can make us laugh and tell us stories," and "someone who knows God and just cares." This discussion made it clear that these students are smart, caring, insightful and that they hope to find this connection after what shows to be a big change in their church life. My personal reflection on this conversation is that not only will the Senior Minister be lucky to have these students wanting to have that connection, but that I am already that lucky to have this connection with them.

Church/faith development to me really has looked different since joining this remarkable church. For me, it focuses on the relationships that are built with our amazing church members, those inside jokes you have with certain 7th graders, that amazing food train after you have a baby (because face it, you would otherwise just starve), listing your church members as emergency contacts for your child's daycare because your family is too far away, that shy/intellectual and beautiful student you love standing in front of an entire congregation reciting such powerful words they have written, and just having a place where you can express your own struggles and real life challenges that is matched with "that's completely normal."

While I hope that the students feel a little comfort knowing their hopes/ideas for the search committee have been reported, biasedly I hope they see how much more lucky our Senior Minister will be to have them, than they are to have the Senior Minister!

## Family Worship Night Magic

Family Worship Night this past Sunday was one of the best ever! No offense if you weren't there. That's not what made it so great. But you did miss out if you weren't!

You may not know what Family Worship Night is. And if you don't, the best way to know is to just come see it happening. I'm warning you now, it is chaos... but the good kind of chaos! We gather together a few evenings during the academic year for fun, to share a meal, and to engage in mission, worship and prayer as a family. We have activities that speak to children from birth to about 4th or 5th grade and even middle school students enjoy it. We typically focus on a theme or a specific story from the Bible. One time it was "Breakfast on the Beach," another it was "The Five Senses," and last week it was "Jesus Was a Refugee." I always tell parents that one of the best parts of it is a free meal that you don't have to cook. Believe me, that's a huge perk!

I'm not sure what it was about the last one that made it so great. Maybe it's because it's freshest in my memory. Really, I think it's several things.

I think it's that Nancy Lear took the time to share with the children the journey a refugee family takes from their home country to their new home in Kansas City. She used bean bags tossed on building blocks to demonstrate war. She used a toy boat, train, car, and airplane to show all of the types of transportation they have to find along the way. She made tents out of construction paper (complete with green grass floors) to show the children what a refugee camp looks like. And she had the children put together a house for the refugee families using toy food, a tea set and doll house furniture. They loved it! I loved it.

I think it's that children understand that something is happening in our world now. They hear their families talking. They hear and see the news on our devices. They go to school with people who are from other countries. They read books that teach them about refugees. They're aware. And I think their minds are ready and waiting to learn and to grow.

I think it's the game we played guessing which names were in the Bible and which weren't. I think they saw their parents cracking up because they had no clue whether they should put their thumbs up or down. I think it's because there were three pastors in the room who got most of the answers wrong...and they thought that was hilarious.

We had fun. And we learned. And we ate. And we grew together. And, I don't know about you, but I think that sounds a whole lot like the meals Jesus shared with those others had cast aside.
