Some days, I read a Wendell Berry poem as a prayer. This one particularly hooked me. I love imagining that the ladder we climb to heaven is heaven itself, even if our feet are on the bottom rung. And I am prompted to ask where in the middle of real life, this ladder is propped up.

For me the screened-in porch is one of the places where the ladder stands. The screens have some holes in them and one screen flaps loose in the breeze where the dog dislodged it. Spider webs form in the corners. But the gentle summer breeze and the ceiling fan keep it a cool place to sit at dawn or dusk. We eat our breakfast there and listen to the morning bird songs.

## A New Thing at 9:01 a.m. Sacred Space/Modern Message

In the book of Isaiah, there's a verse that reads, "Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old. I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?" (Is. 43:18-19). This fall the church is doing a new thing with our 9:00 service on Sunday mornings, but not so new that folks should forget the things of old. It's more a combination of the best of both.

For the last six months a task force has pondered what people love best about the outdoor service each summer and what that might look like indoors. If you've been to the outdoor service, you understand. Words like "casual," "family-friendly," and "intergenerational" quickly became the essence of what we envisioned.

We are calling this new service 9:01- Sacred Space/Modern Message as a way to honor our gorgeous architecture while reaching people with a timely message for our day. The 9:01 reference also echoes something in found in Psalm 90:1, about how God has been "our dwelling place in all generations."

Families are encouraged to join the regulars at 9:00 a.m., and also to invite people not currently attending our church.

Here are some of the basics of what this new service will look like:

- Casual in feel and attire; you really can come as you are.
- Lively and engaging music, drawing from the best of historic hymns and new songs.
- Families with children will be invited to participate by lighting candles, reading scripture, and collecting offering.
- Children who attend can partake of communion or receive a blessing and hear a children's sermon before departing to choir and other age-appropriate activities for the second half of the service.
- A time of prayer and sermon in the second half will allow adults to be fully present and focus on God.

Two Q&A sessions have been scheduled to answer any questions you might have about this new service.

I write my sermons there some weeks. In the evening we sip a drink and neighbors stop by for a visit uninvited and unannounced. It has become our favorite room of the house. It is hard to rush on a screened in porch. It invites a slow down.

Summer's long days invite us to pause and pay attention to the ladder. Both "where we work by day and at night sleep." Where in your daily routine do you place your foot on the bottom rung of the ladder that leads to heaven? Is it reading a bed time story to a toddler at night or watching children splash and squeal in delight in the pool? Is there a task or responsibility at work that brings you joy? Or a part of your personal rhythm of daily rest that brings the ladder of heaven into focus again? If so, place a stone there to remember that the holy invades the ordinary, when we have eyes to see.

## No Service and Fully Connected

t was three full days of "no service."

When I realize I am digitally disconnected from world a slight panic mode ensues. At first it's a lonely feeling because I spend my life 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year connected to the world through the technology of my cell phone and internet. The what ifs start creeping into mind about who may need to get ahold of me, what if there is an emergency,

what if I need to reach out to somebody. I start to wonder about what I will be missing on Facebook and Instagram, what's going to happen in the news cycle that I won't immediately be informed about, how I won't get to show my friends what I am doing on Snapchat.

All the anxiety and nervousness about being disconnected lasted for like, 10 minutes. I got over it pretty quickly, which clued me into something I hadn't been aware of as we made our way down to Table Rock Lake for the 4th of July festivities. I needed – actually I was thirsty – to just simply be for a couple days. I left my cell phone on the bed-side table in the morning and walked out the door to embrace the world unfiltered and uninterrupted.

It is incredible what we hear and see when we're out in the world without any distractions. In the woods we could hear the Earth talking through the sounds of the winds and the birds chirping. On the water we could hear the stories that the lake was telling. At meals the conversation was beautiful and at night the joy of kids laughing and playing filled our hearts. It was everything I needed in that moment to pause, take a breath, and enjoy the world that God has been creating around us.

If you're like me, you wouldn't have just simply put your cell phone away if you weren't forced to, but I'm so grateful it happened. Because even when we're on vacation or taking time away we need to be encouraged to really be present with world and people directly surrounding us. It takes moments to be disconnected from one world to be fully connected to the world of God around us.<sup>T</sup>

## A New Perspective

The friends we were traveling with suggested a guided bicycle tour. Never in a million miles of travel could I have convinced my husband this was a fun idea, but majority ruled and that's how we found ourselves rolling through some parts of Chicago we'd never

seen, despite having visited the city dozens of times. It's funny how different something familiar can look

when you see it from a fresh perspective.

Yes, we'd been to the Fulton Market District, but we'd never eaten tlayuda at Cruz Blanca. (Highly recommended.) Yes, we'd been in classic Chicago dive bars, but never tried a "Chicago Handshake." (Not so highly recommended.) Yes, we'd roamed cool streets, but we'd never heard of The 606, a gorgeous, elevated park/trail. Yes, we'd seen Lake Michigan, but we'd never cruised alongside it as the fog rolled in and you could just barely make out the sparkling top of a silver skyscraper catching a stray kiss of sunlight.

Since that Chicago weekend, which also included one of the best meals we've ever eaten, we keep coming back to conversation about the bike tour. It was a good reminder that coming at a familiar thing from a fresh perspective can give you a whole new experience. Take church for example. Here are some ways you might experience church from a new perspective:

- Attend a different worship service than you normally do. Try the outdoor service. Try a chapel service. Sit in a different pew. Sit in the balcony. Sit toward the front.
- After worship, greet folks you might not otherwise chat with.
- Stop by the church on a weekday. See all the work that is done here Monday through Friday. Sit in the quiet, darkened Sanctuary for a bit.
- Try a new class. Not the Bible study type? Great, you have an even better opportunity to see a fresh perspective.
- Serve with the Children's or Youth Ministries. You'll be especially enlightened by our children and youth and their perspectives on God and life.
- Read the church newsletter from cover to cover. You'll be surprised by what you learn.
