Sometimes, fiction allows us to glimpse the truth of God and the human spirit "at a slant" in the words of poet Emily Dickenson. Still looking for an August read? How about:

Eternal Life by Dara Horn – This recent novel tells the story of a woman who is unable to die, though she wants too. She was born in the Holy Land, about the time of Jesus but is now living in current times in New York. Not only was it a good read and interesting history about biblical times, but it prompted me to ponder why we don't actually want to live forever.

The Great Alone by Kristin Hannah – I couldn't put it down. To say that it is about a hippy family who moves to Alaska to start over just doesn't do it justice. I fell in love with the main character and gained a new appreciation for those who find themselves victims

of PTSD and domestic violence. The resilience of the human spirit gave me hope.

Killers of the Flower Moon by David Gran is not fiction but it reads like it. I was astounded to find how little I knew about a tragic chapter of history among my Native American neighbors in Oklahoma .

Crossing to Safety by Wallace Stegner remains my favorite novel of all time. A simple story of two couples who share a life-long friendship, elegantly captures the magic of the ordinary. Both the prose and the character development are as good as it gets!

If you'd like to read a book more explicitly about the Christian journey, I suggest Norman Wirzba's *Way of Love: Recovering the Heart of Christianity.* A divinity school classmate of mine, Wirzba unlocks complicated theology with personal stories of everyday modern life.

Or if you enjoy poetry, I suggest: Joy: 100 Poems by Christian Wiman, former editor of Poetry magazine and a professor at Yale who was diagnosed with an incurable form of cancer as a young man. This collection and his introduction point to a joy beyond mere happiness.

This summer brought the rebirth of the Amani Choir. This partnership, led by Amanda Sipes, is a way to bridge the trauma of refugee resettlement with music therapy. We sent our 12th mission trip group to Nicaragua where people across borders worked together to build new gardens and new pathways to sustainability. Another fall and spring Grace at Work sent Country Club Christian Church members to our partnerships to beautify gardens, prepare for fundraising events, cultivate grounds and support organizations to do their best work. As well, our Della Lamb group has been working graciously to set up houses for refugees coming into the metro area.

It is overjoying to think back to all the ways we have been in partnership together with our community over the last year! It's all possible because of our compassionate, neighbor loving, and justice seeking community that is dedicated to bringing about healthy lives for all peoples. Our work is always just beginning and always becoming and God calls us to keep going and doing and coming and seeing. T

Another Name for Community Camp

n the movie, Cool Hand Luke, there is a classic scene culminating with Paul Newman's timeless line, "What we've got here is failure to communicate." Pardon the grammar, and never mind the context; but I think the same could be said about our church's annual Community Camp. (Shortly after coming on staff, I had a conversation about the upcoming men's retreat at Tall Oaks Camp. This person's reply? "I'm not really into anything with the word camp in it.")

Like I said, failure to communicate. And it's not just the word camp. The annual gathering takes place at a YMCA. Ask anyone you know what comes to mind when they hear that, and more likely than not it's the song about how it's fun to stay there (with hand motions, no less) or they picture a walking track surrounding exercise equipment, accompanied with the smell of sweat.

Picture instead a week in breathtaking (not too strong a word) Estes Park, Colorado. Picture the lodge where we stay somewhere along the lines of a Motel 6, maybe a little nicer. As for the YMCA, picture the world's largest Y, with miniature golf, swimming pool, basketball, horseshoes, riding stables, Frisbee golf, and the list goes on and on. All of this nestled on the edge of Rocky Mountain National Park, complete with deer, elk, moose, and all manner of beautiful butterflies.

But I'm a theologian, not a travel agent. So let me share what I think are the best things about Community Camp, and in no particular order: 1) Intergenerational. Where else do kids and adults who aren't related get to hang out together? 2) Unstructured. Besides breakfast and dinner, the latter prefaced by a short devotional, you're free to hike or nap or read or play golf or shop in town. 3) Tradition. It quickly becomes obvious some folks have been coming for years and they are eager to share the rituals with newbies, including the amazing induction ceremony of Mountain Women. 4) The people. It's easy to think of our church as the building on Ward Parkway, when in reality it's all the people. But in KC, we rarely get to enjoy each other's company for any prolonged sense of time. Sitting on the ample deck of the lodge and visiting with others from our church is an amazing treat.

I could go on, but you get the idea. I think. Feel free to ask me or any of the folks who have been before. Next year's experience is July 27-August 3, and registration is open. Hope to see you there.

A July Full of Music

L is a thrill for me to be able to share some recent, extraordinary musical experiences with you, thanks to the support of the Country Club Christian Church congregation. On July 3, we sponsored an organ concert as part of the American Guild of Organists National Convention, held in Kansas City

for the first time. I was told to expect about 600 people for the performance. We had at least 1000 people seated in the sanctuary, and extra chairs. The preschool children were excited to see the convention tour buses lined up along the curb. Our facilities, tech, and membership development staff went out of their way to make sure that every detail was in place. Welcoming greeters were excited to introduce so many new people to our beautiful space, and the Zappia sculpture received a great deal of attention. Minister of Music Emeritus, David Diebold, returned from Texas to attend the convention and help sell tickets at the event. We remain grateful to the Neihart family for their generous gift to the American Guild of Organists so that we could all remember Carlene in this once-in-a-lifetime event. At a conference workshop the next day, I sat by a woman from North Carolina. When I shared that I was employed here at Country Club Christian, she said that as the buses pulled up to the church on Tuesday afternoon, she and her husband immediately saw the sign out front – and noticed that the senior minister had a feminine name. They opted to sit in the balcony for the concert, and, as they walked up the stairway, marveled at the portraits of all the previous ministers, knowing that this church had made a definitive statement.

Two weeks later, I was able to represent the church at the annual Hymn Society conference, "Sacred Song in the Public Square", in St. Louis. My goal was to find resources that we could use in worship services, reflecting progressive theology and inclusive language. While the days were long, I was pleased to learn of so many resources, and to renew and build a network of considerate, thoughtful, and helpful colleagues.

The mission of the Hymn Society is "to encourage, promote, and enliven congregational singing." I look forward to sharing more music and meaningful texts with you over the coming year and thank you for your support of the music here at Country Club Christian Church.
