From the Senior Minister Anchored in God

"For a spiritual life is simply a life in which all that we do comes from the centre, where we are anchored in God..."

—The Spiritual Life by Evelyn Underhill

This line

jumped off the page for me during my morning reflection time earlier this week. And it has haunted me all week. I began to wonder if all that I do comes from the centre, from that place where I am securely anchored in God. Sometimes we think that God is "out there" but Christian mystics like Underhill remind us that this holy presence of God is also within our own souls and that part of the challenge is attending to this inner life.

Often times, our decisions and habits come not from our "centre, where we are anchored in God" but from our frayed edges. The clutter of worry, stress, anxiety and fear creeps in uninvited. The lawn needs to be mowed. A teenager huffs away and slams the door. Granddad needs help filing quarterly taxes. As we rush around with life's practical realities we cannot even remember, let alone attend to, the centre. All we can think about is getting through the day.

Underhill wonders if the reason we experience life's conflicts and difficulties so keenly is because we have attempted to separate our spiritual life

I long for the simplicity that Underhill describes. Each day we are bombarded by so many options: Facebook, Instagram, television, poetry, a walk in the park, a conversation with a neighbor. What would empower us to pay closer attention to the spirit of God alive within us and around us? The goal I think is not become more "spiritual" but to become more whole, the person that we were each created to be.

A Big Something....Or Not?

itting in the reception hall for a friend's wedding the music plays an engaging melody while the newly married couple takes to the dance floor. Twinkling soft lights give off a fuzzy glow that makes the space a bit magical, long tables are graced with elegant flower arrangements that add color and beauty. And swept up in all the celebrating is an unusual grouping of people

who if we were to read about them in short written bios would leave you wondering how in the world they came to be in this place together. A man who could be labeled homophobic – dances with his granddaughter's wife; a woman who has rarely traveled outside the county lines talking with an exchange student from the middle east; people from large cities being hosted by small town farmers – all these people linked in one way or another to the bride and groom found meaningful connections in this moment.

At this time in our world, groupings like the recent wedding I attended seem a rarity...and yet they may be the salvation of our communities. I have been wanting something big to happen: an opportunity that would heal the deep wounds our country seems to be inflicting on one other; a shared experience through which a path forward emerges taking us arm in arm into a renewed future; a miraculous event that pushes back our differences to make room for our commonalities. But this wedding has made me rethink this need for a BIG something. Witnessing all those simple connecting points in that celebration demonstrates we may just need to be together, to be reminded how connected we are and how those connections bind us to something much bigger.

Author Brene Brown frames this connection saying, "Spirituality is recognizing and celebrating that we are all inextricably connected to each other by a power greater than all of us, and that our connection to that power and to one another is grounded in love and compassion."

Our connections to one another through the grace filled Spirit that lives within all of us can still be found in the most unlikely places. Who knew along with the vows, the toasts, the dancing – the mismatched group of wedding goers were practicing a type of spirituality deeply needed in this broken world.

A Picture Is Worth a Thousand Words

photographer friend once told me that to get one good photo, you have to take 100 shots. This was back before every mobile phone came with a decent quality camera, and I was still shooting film using 24 or 36 exposure rolls. Today, every photo I take is digital, which means no waiting a couple of days

or even an hour to see if the lighting is right, if people's eyes are closed, if the composition of a shot works. I can take hundreds of photos in a few minutes without worrying about the cost and waste associated with developing film, and I can usually tell immediately if the photos I'm taking are good.

"Good," though, is a relative term because I'm no professional. I have a decent eye and a really good camera about which I know enough to be dangerous. But as the church's Director of Communications, I use photos almost every day to help tell Country Club Christian Church's story. Which is why on Sundays you are likely to see me toting my Nikon and desperately trying to remain unobtrusive while still getting the right angle. Sometimes I'm lucky enough to capture something magical: gleeful children; intergenerational relationships; sacred moments.

While each week I do take hundreds of photos in search of that one perfect shot, I can't be at every church gathering. Here's where you come in. Raise your hand if you own a smart phone. Yep, that's the majority of you. Next time you're at a church event or



even just gathered with church friends, shoot a couple of photos for me. Try to get people's faces (not backs of heads). Send them to me at laras@ccckc.org with a brief caption describing what you're doing. I'd love to see the moments you capture; to have a broader and more diverse selection of photos to help tell our story. I'll even give you photo credit. 🔻
