From the Senior Minister What Is Saving Your Life?

hat is saving your life right now? Years ago Barbara Brown Taylor was invited to speak at an Episcopal church. "What should I lk about?" she

talk about?" she asked the priest. "Just talk about

what is saving your life right now," the priest responded.

It's a wonderful question that rolls around in my brain sometimes. In my father in law's final week of life on this earth, the pain became difficult to manage. One day the hospice nurse administered some morphine and he grimaced at the terrible taste in his mouth. His daughter leaned in to stroke his arm and tears spilled down her cheeks. Though his voice was weak, Dad mouthed to her, "It's ok, sweetie" Through those brutally heavy days, what saved us was seeing his gentle kindness. We held on to each other. Seeing the family reach out with love and compassion, weeping together, that saved us too.

Over the past several months, I got to sit with several church members to dialogue about our 100 year heritage and ponder our next 100 years. One member told me "the church completely changed my life." And another said "the church helped us become a family." Every person I talked to acknowledged the shifting

cultural trends that adversely affect the church. It is no secret that church membership and church participation in the U.S. is on a downward trajectory. But at the same time, the messages I kept hearing from young and old was that the church was pivotal in their own personal formation, a spiritual anchor. These conversations were life-saving to me. They reminded me that the church is not just a cultural institution, a pretty building, or a dinosaur, but rather a group of folks who seek the life changing love of God. It gave me courage and hope to hear that God is still whispering and shouting, still challenging and comforting, inside these old stone walls and shimmering stained glass.

As we journey through Lent, let's keep asking ourselves, "What is saving my life right now?" Because the God who walked around in the person of Jesus 2000 years ago, still moves and breathes in our world today. We experience some terrible days and some joyful ones. Much of that is beyond our control. But we can keep asking "What is saving your life right now?" Is it a friend, a spouse, a garden, a song, a job, a child, a dream, a goal? Asking the question may help us experience the Christ who went to the cross for love and rose again. It is more than an old story. It is happening to us today.

Notes of the Unknown

Rev. Tyler Heston, Minister to Youth



"I'm the only girl in my P. E. class." "I didn't know my friend was adopted." "I remember being overwhelmed the first day of calculus, when I was the only freshman in an all-junior class." "I didn't know that childhood friend was actually a second-cousin."

he high schoolers at last week's Ecuador team

meeting gave such answers in response to two

questions. First, when were you in a situation in which you felt that you did not belong? Second, when was a time that you found out something surprising about someone you knew well? Each answer by itself was just a fleeting reminder of moments that confronted us with the unknown; together, everyone's stories created a palpable sense of how much is unknown in the world.

These discussion questions were a little icebreaker that kicked off our meeting, a way to get to know each other a little bit better and to warm our minds to the deeper discussion about being in a foreign country. Eighteen of us are traveling to Otavalo, Ecuador, in June — 15 high schoolers, Lori Bennett, Nancy Lear, and myself — to spend a week learning about and supporting a nonprofit that works with community development in rural communities across the country. We're excited to travel together to a new part of the globe with two missions in mind: to serve and to learn.

We will serve by partnering with people working on a daycare building that offers accessible childcare for working mothers. We will learn a lot. We'll learn about daycare buildings in Ecuador, and we'll about day-to-day life in rural Ecuador— a place very different from urban and suburban America. We're going to learn new foods, meet new people, and new words in a different language. We're going to learn new ways that people flourish and thrive with far fewer resources than most of us have. We're going to learn new ways to think about God from the new people we meet. We will feel like we don't belong, and we will be surprised by things we learn. We're going to see that there is indeed much in the world that we didn't know.

The unknown can be scary, especially when you're confronted by it by travelling to a new part of the world. Yet, the unknown can also be a sacred, vital balance to the known. God is not just in things that are familiar but is also in things that are new, different—in things unknown. Author and speaker Rob Bell talks about how things like knowing and unknowing or faith and doubt "are not opposites; they're dance partners. It's possible to hold your faith with open hands, living with great conviction and yet at the same time humbly admitting that your knowledge and perspective will always be limited."

Our week in Ecuador will give us a chance to practice dance as we explore the harmonies of unknown, and I can't wait to come home to hear the harmonies more clearly in our everyday life. I pray when we return, this hearing is contagious, and that we will help show you that everyday is filled with awesome unknowns that contain the presence of divine mystery.


Faith and Grief Lunch: A Good Death

he cold and snowy winter frequently prevented the children from playing outside the past few months. We are blessed to have large spaces like the Social Hall and the Pine Room where we can run around and use up some of that endless energy that children have, but the teachers still had to get creative with

classroom activities.

Since taking off their shoes and socks is a favorite toddler activity, the teachers in room 17 filled six shallow pans with a variety of wet and dry materials (oatmeal, rice, bubble wrap, shaving cream and warm water) for the children to walk through.

As expected, the children each reacted differently. Some of the children couldn't wait to step into the pans, and went right back to the beginning when they finished. A few of the children needed an adult hand to hold, but Charlie and Gigi wanted no part of the activity. Charlie clung to his teacher and wouldn't let go, while Gigi repeated, "No way Miss 'Lizabeth, no way!"

After two days of coaxing and encouragement from her mom, Gigi was no closer to participating. On day three, Miss Elizabeth had everyone experiment with the materials using their hands first. Then the whole class, teachers and children, took off their shoes and socks before walking through the tubs. The room was filled with giggles and excited screams.

One of the teachers reminds us at every staff meeting that we learn something new from the children every day so the lesson for today, "When you are apprehensive about trying something new, start with a finger before you jump in with both feet."
