I wish it wasn't a 45 minute drive from Lawrence because this is where I would like to go each Sunday." At the Nancy Zschietzschmann Memorial Bach concert, the organ soloist gave a brief testimony before her solo, explaining how profoundly influenced her own children had been by Nancy's mentorship, sponsorship and encouragement. Then she played her piece, for Nancy, our long time member who died last year.

And at the final concert, we removed the table and screen that typically hide the organ. Toddlers gathered round the organ and were mesmerized by those four keyboards, foot peddles and myriad stops. Some of them sat on the bench with Andrew, our assistant organist and played those grand notes together.

What began with a dream about music became an experience of community, hope, and love. This holy mystery called God can never be fully known but can sometimes be experienced through music.

Rekindling Light

Recently a friend told me of a book she said I must read. It is not a new book – just one she happened upon in the library, and after reading she could not believe she had not heard of the story. *Life In A Jar: The Irena Sendler Project* is the title of this creative non-fiction story. It has ties to Kansas, as a group of high school girls researched the main character for a history project and ultimately lifted up

the remarkable story of Sendler and her rescue of countless Jewish children in Warsaw, Poland during WW II. We learn of the risks taken by this woman and a network of allies she created to bring children out of the Jewish ghetto and into safe homes in order to survive. Her bravery was only matched by her desire to honor the familial connections of these young Jewish lives. I will leave the rest of the story for you to discover.

My connection with this book began before I even turned to chapter one, for in the opening a quote is shared that has stayed with me, comforted me, challenged me...

"Sometimes our light goes out, but is blown again into instant flame by an encounter with another human being. Each of us owes the deepest thanks to those who have rekindled this inner light." - Albert Schweitzer

I have always resonated with images of light – and how we use this idea of a shining light to describe what comes from within – our soul, our spirit. This idea of light coming from within dances on the edge of mystery and speaks to the essence of that which connects us all. But until I read those words I had not been able to reconcile the times when the light fades or is so dim or when complete darkness envelopes us with the idea of a light that does not die.

The reality of life can overshadow our light when the suffering in the world leaves us feeling powerless. The harshness of daily life can dim our light when our boss berates us, when our children lash out, when devastating news is delivered to us. So many ways for our light to be put out – but that is not where it ends. For as beloved children of God we are made to be in relationship and when we engage with others our light begins to grow.

As I think through the many people in my life who share their flame I am in awe of the depth of goodness that is still very present in the world. Too often we may feel the darkness lingering but as ones seeking to be faithful we can be assured the light will always prevail over and over again!

Sacred Listening

ach Sunday during worship, I have a moment when I think "I'm probably not supposed to be doing this." That moment comes during The Lord's Prayer, when—while everyone else in the room is doing what they're supposed to be doing, which is reciting those sacred and familiar

words aloud—I find myself not doing it. Not because I'm trying to be irreverent, or because I don't care or don't think it's important.

I think it all started when my daughter was young and we'd reach that part of worship and I'd listen to see if she knew all the words. Then I realized that hearing her little-girl voice saying those words added meaning to them for me. Later, I was struck by the sound in the room during the Prayer. All those voices woven into a harmonic tapestry not unlike the finest anthem. The room buzzes with spiritual energy as everyone (well, almost everyone) lifts his or her voice. For a moment the air in the room changes as the sound waves—high and low, young and old, feminine and masculine—reverberate about the sanctuary.

I've never asked anyone if it's particularly wrong to not add my voice, to take this moment of the service as my own private form of worship. Maybe I shouldn't be admitting it here. Maybe our ministers, whose theological insight I respect greatly, would tell me I'm violating some sacred rule in my secret listening.

But I hope not. Because listening can be sacred too. Especially in a world where there is so much noise, so many opinions, so many people shouting...online, on television, sometimes even at home and work. The 24-hour news cycle, never ending Twitter feed, and political discord contribute to what feels like an increasingly divisive culture, one in which we're desperate to be heard, to shout our support for this issue or that, to condemn this politician's positions or that person's ignorance. But it's also a culture where maybe we aren't doing enough listening.

Communication fails when messages aren't received. If no one's listening, no one is hearing, understanding, learning, empathizing.

So I take my moment on Sunday mornings as a reminder to listen to those sacred words, not just speak them. $\overline{\mathbb{T}}$
