### From the Senior Minister Window into God



December some of us struggle to balance the extra demands on our time with a longing to remain spiritually centered.

How do we embrace

the busyness, fun, and festivities that honor the arrival of the sacred while also carving out a still small moment to reflect and ponder the meaning of this beautiful season? I love the story about the church that often used a doll for the baby Jesus. One year they decided to make it better by using a real baby. But just as the children's choir sang "no crying he makes" the infant screamed a horrific cry. And the baby's big sister shouted at him to shut up. Sometimes Christmas doesn't feel very holy.

In his book, The Universal Christ, Richard Rohr writes, "The full Christian leap of faith is trusting that Jesus together with Christ gave us one human but fully accurate window into the Eternal Now that we call God." I love the reminder that the one born in a manger was a fully accurate window into God. When you think about that "fully accurate window" what do you picture? The way he touched a leper who could have given him a horrific disease, the way

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he shared the trout in his picnic basket with the neighbor on food stamps, the moments he refused to return insults with insults and embraced his enemy with tender compassion.

Rohr goes on to say, "Frankly, Jesus came to show us how to be human much more than how to be spiritual..." And so as we think about how to navigate the stress of the holidays and the challenges of life in general, we have a model. Jesus showed us how to be human. He forgave those who hurt him. He took time alone to pray and sit with God in silence. He welcomed children. He broke the rules of society that shut out women and foreigners and invited all to God's banquet table.

As we look back on the sweetness of the manger, we remember that the straw was smelly. It may not have been idyllic. But the real sweetness of that night is that the one born amidst the muck grew up and became a window into God.  $\overline{\mathbb{Y}}$

## Caring for Creation: Composting Initiative



The children call it in our Parents' Day Out program call it "making good dirt." Most adults call it composting. No matter what you call it, it is good.

We composted the food waste from both the Thanksgiving dinner and Advent in Advance, two green events in less than a week. Thank you to all the volunteers and attendees who bussed dishes. We served 177 meals at Thanksgiving and 125 at Advent in Advance. In total we diverted 74 pounds of food

waste from the landfill. Not only does composting return nutrients to the earth, it also avoids the production of methane. According to the EPA, methane warms the earth 80 times greater than carbon dioxide. After our events, the compost is picked up by Compost Collective KC. They work with their partners, MO organics and some local farmers, and turn our waste into nutrient rich soil. Since it is commercial composting, the compost reaches much higher temperature than a home composter so meat and dairy can be included. We do pay a small fee for this service for our large events but not for the weekly program. We appreciate your support and look forward to more opportunities to "make good dirt."

### Caring for Creation: Coffee Cups

Did you know that disposable coffee cups and lids are not recyclable nor compostable? Although the cups are made of paper, they are also lined with plastic to prevent leakage. The lids fall into the wheels of the recycling sorter and bind up the line. Like many to-go containers, they should not be put in the recycling bins.

Country Club Christian Church purchases disposal cups that are sustainably sourced but the best source is a cup you can reuse. We spend approximately \$2,500 a year on paper goods. We invite you to bring your favorite to-go cup or use one of the reusable cups in the parlor. Just drop it off in the bin and we will do the dishes.

This is one small step that helps us be better stewards of our resources and leaves only coffee rings.

### Bible and Art Tour of Italy

Calling all lovers of art and Scripture (as well as pasta, wine, and gelato). In the late spring of 2021 (May 24-June 3, 2021), we will venture to Rome and Florence for an unforgettable tour of museums, cathedrals, Renaissance architecture, and the Tuscan countryside. Donna Houtteman, a docent at the Nelson-Atkins Museum, along with Rev. Carla Aday and Dr. Mike Graves, will lead this inspirational journey. In addition to guided tours, there will be free days for leisure and day trips to choose from.

The cost of the trip will be approximately \$4,000 per person, which include roundtrip airfare, lodging in four-star hotels, breakfasts, and guided tours of museums and other sites. A non-refundable deposit will be due February 20. Between now and January 31, we are taking names of church members who wish to go. After that, we will take names of non-members. ## Joyful Communion

f you look up the word communion in the dictionary, the first entry simply reads "sharing," whereas other entries have the usual religious overtones. Turns out, sharing is precisely what the Greek word means as well, only with definite religious overtones. When we eat the bread and drink the cup, we are sharing in a meal with God. But there is also a horizontal dimension, sharing with one another, a sharing of food as well as our lives.

Historically, the meal pattern of Jesus and his followers was influenced by Greco-Roman banqueting, even the so-called Last Supper. These banquets lasted the better part of an evening, and included a full meal, not just bread and wine. Sharing life together was an integral part. The one Greek word used to describe that kind of social sharing is best translated "festive joy," which seems redundant. Isn't joy always festive, and festive always joyful? And yet that's the term used to describe what we now call Communion, festive joy.

Change is hard of course. For many of us, Communion is a time for prayer and silent reflection, which would have made no sense to our ancestors in the faith who gathered in the spirit of a dinner party. Times change, but thankfully in all of our services we have time not just for greeting one another but also silent moments for prayer and reflection because this is a cherished tradition for many of us.

Since this is the 300th anniversary of the carol "Joy to the World," we adopted that as our theme for Advent this year. And with joy in the title, it seemed that joyful Communion made sense. If you have never experienced it, joyful Communion happens best not with the passing of trays but with stations where worshipers take a piece of bread and dip it in the cup. That's because instead of worshipers silently passing trays (which doesn't exactly promote sharing in the fullest sense of the word), people make their way forward and back to their seats, talking with one another as they do. Some people call that "fellowship," which by the way, is another translation for the Greek word called sharing. In other words, for these few Sundays of Advent, we are sharing bread and cup together, but also our lives.

### In Memory

y father-in-law was a man of few words. He worked hard and had high expectations for the people in his life. He was fiercely private and kept his circle small. He was a cowboy and a lifelong horseman, spending hours tending to his last three geldings, Blue, Hondo, and

Catcher, at a ranch in Washington, Mo.

He was set in his ways, stubborn some might say. He preferred the quiet of his home, the familiar space he shared with the family he loved. When I appeared on the scene, I confounded him with a wildly different worldview that he eventually came to respect. He radiated an intensity that masked his soft side, but an old softie he was. He always ate the last cookie in the middle of the night when no one was watching. And when a raven-haired, darkeyed baby girl made him a grandfather, she immediately wrapped him around her finger.

Even toward the end, when late-stage Parkinson's disease robbed him of his dignity and his pride, he was quick with a one-liner that made us laugh. And when the fog of dementia set in, he still longed for home, the familiar place where he felt peace.

As I write today, a few days removed from his memorial service, I'm also working on a funeral bulletin for the mother of a member of our church family. All told, in nearly 13 years of working for the church, I've helped to prepare more than 2,000 different bulletins for Sunday services, Christmas Eve, funerals and other events. The work can be tedious and antiseptic, copying and pasting hundreds of words, ensuring font sizes are the same and hymn numbers are correct. I agonize over typos that make it to Sunday, my perfectionism and ego haunting me and ruining my worship experience. It can feel very mundane and unimportant, putting words on a screen; then sending that screen to a printer resulting in the paper you hold in your hands on Sunday, on Christmas Eve...at a memorial service.

But as I held the program for my father-in-law's service, I was deeply grateful to my husband who had designed it with great love and care. I was moved to see the names of the hymns my daughter and I had so lovingly chosen printed in black and white on the page. I was comforted by the photo of him taken at my wedding, one of the only times in his life he wore a tuxedo.

Sometimes a job is more than a job; it's a ministry. Sometimes a program is more than paper, it's a memory, a tribute, a life in black and white.  $\mathbb{T}$
