
## OUTREACH AND SERVICE

Grace at Work Days took place at Della Lamb, Cross-Lines, Micah Ministries, Jerusalem Farm, River of Refuge, Grace United and Harvesters.

At Hartman Elementary, 286 hours of tutoring for students and 77 hours toward Staff Appreciation Activities. In addition, 1,397 clothing items were donated through Monthly Collection Connections.

For Micah Ministries, 600 slices of pumpkin pie were prepared for guests and 225 Warmth Packs were created and delivered.

Small Group Serving Sessions included The Harmony Project food distributions, snack preparation and Amethyst Place Special events, Bring 'Em Home; Tunes on Troost; Encompass Program.

# Create sustainable "Small Group factories" to foster relationships

In January, a new Sunday School class launched "The Travelers", to serve folks in middle adulthood.

To connect young families with children under the age of 3, staff began hosting Babies and Breakfast one Saturday a month.

Additional new small groups included Senior High Late Start Coffee, Lenten Study Groups, and Coffee and Conversation.



In November, we hosted combined worship services with Swope Parkway United Christian Church. The 11am featured a combined choir with lead pastors from both churches preaching.

On January 10, 2023, the Congregational Board of Country Club Christian Church approved the resolution to become designated as Open and Affirming.

Executive Minister, Reverend Bryce Bowers, joined the staff in January 2023 and was a major player in the database conversion that allows for a more complete visitor tracking procedure. The member and visitor check-in process was completely overhauled to capture more visitor and

member attendance information. We look forward to a new "path to membership" debuting this fall!

# Invite church-unaffiliated & engage younger families & individuals



Christian Community Camp hosted 32 adults and 38 children during the week-long camp in Estes Park, Co.

"Trunk or Treat" asks members to decorate their trunk in a fun way and hand out treats to costumed kids. Crafts and games are also included in this event. This year we hosted over 250 members and neighbors.

On March 26, The Next 100 Groundbreaking took place with over 125 in attendance.

Easter activities included the annual Spring Fling and brunch between the 9am and 11am Easter Services.

Our first International Women's Day event was held on March 8 and hosted 30 women.



In June, staff hosted "Bingo in the Park" to encourage community during the time that the building was not available for gathering. There were over 65 people in attendance.

This year over 273 people took a tour of Dominic Zappia's sculpture of "The Last Supper" and listened to the eight-minute recorded narrative that helps bring the scene alive.


